Boy badly frozen—Mount Zion neighborhood, five miles east of this place, was in great excitement two or three days last week over the mysterious disappearance of the nine-year-old adopted boy of Thomas Sherwood, who was not seen from Sunday morning, when sent to the field to look after the sheep, till Wednesday forenoon when found in a helpless and pitiable condition on a neighbor's farm about eighty rods from home. One hand and both feet were badly frozen, one foot so severely that the attending physician fears that amputation of half of it may be necessary and perhaps the toes from the other. From the time the alarm was given of the boy's absence the neighbors were out en masse searching for him and the marvel of all is that he was found alive after three days and three nights without food and shelter in inclement weather. Once or twice before the boy was missing for a short time and being an intelligent lad the impulse to this act is not yet clear.
