When Burns Played Lacrosse.

George L. Allen of Mount Forest, past president of the C. L. A. contributes the following interesting stories of Tommy Burns—Noah Brusso—as a Canadian lacrosse player.

"The heavyweight championship of the world was won by an old friend, Noah Brusso, a former member of the Lorne Lacrosse Club of Mount Forest. The last season he played lacrosse in Canada he played with the Lornes of this town, and went from here to Detroit. I may say that he was clever with the gloves before he left Mount Forest. Those were among the Lornes' palmy days, when the town always had a good team, and that season we had the luxury of a club room. The club supplied a set of boxing gloves and Brusso had some heavy rounds with the boys, especially with big 'Indian Scott,' formerly of Chesley, who played several seasons with the Lornes, and who was a good scrapper. You should remember the spectacular game played on the Island in 1900 between Shelburne and Mount Forest for the championship of the north-western district, when the former won by the narrow margin of one goal, the score being 13 to 14. Brusso played on the home for the Lornes, and he and Dinny Madill had several scraps during the game, and were going to settle who was the best man just after the game, when friends interfered. The Lornes should have won that game, but 'Burnie' Hamilton, our old reliable goalkeeper, could not stop a ball on that day.

When Shelburne played in Mount Forest, Chas. McKeown, M. P. P., was referee, and in the first quarter ruled Brusso off for the balance of the game for giving the Shelburne goalkeeper a knock out blow on the face with his fist. The ball had been thrown behind the flags and Brusso and the goalkeeper followed it, the former leading. The goalkeeper kept tapping Brusso on the arm until they reached the ball, when Noah could stand it no longer, and dropping his stick as was his custom, he landed his tormenter one on the face. The Lornes were sore at the decision, and the eleven that were left trimmed Shelburne 4 goals to 2. I was instrumental in securing Brusso a job in our woollen mills, but, not liking that, he did some house painting, and finally acting as agent for enlarging photos. He was temperate in his habits, and not a bit lazy. He played for the love of the game, as he got nothing on the side but what he earned.

I had the pleasure of meeting him at his home in Los Angeles the past summer and found him still temperate in habits and a hard trainer. He is very modest in speaking of his victories, but was very anxious to become the real heavyweight champion of the world which title he now proudly bears. Canada for ever!"

THE GLOBE'S REBUKE OF MAYOR KENNEDY.

The Globe writes editorially as follows on the attitude of Mayor Kennedy in regard to local option in Owen Sound:—

"In Mr. Irwin's letter in another column will be found specific statements quoted from a letter written by Mayor Kennedy, of Owen Sound, to be sent to Barrie, where a local option contest is now in progress. In that letter the Mayor states that 'the writer knows places where liquor can be purchased,' and that the sale of liquor goes on 'in spite of the fact that there are four constables employed by the corporation. Owen Sound is under prohibition, and has been so since a local option by-law came in force many months ago.'"

"It seems strange that Mayor Kennedy does not see the absurdity of the position in which he places himself. It is his duty as Chief Magistrate of Owen Sound to see that all laws are properly enforced so far as it is the duty of the police to enforce them. He does not say that he has made any effort either to perform his own duty in the premises or to constrain others to perform theirs. Under the circumstances the electors of Barrie will do well to treat Mayor Kennedy's letter as a fair subject for inquiry, but not as entitled to exercise any influence in moulding their opinions on the expediency of adopting the local option by-law now before them."

A Sad Story of Consumption in a Canadian Town

The Local Hospital Unable to Care for the Patient, and the query is What to Do?

In a little booklet issued by the National Sanitarium Association under whose auspices has been established the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives, we have the story told of a sad case of consumption.

A young woman, apparently friendless, came in on a train reaching Fort William, and immediately procured work as a domestic. A doctor was called in to examine her case, as she appeared to be a consumptive, and she was at once pronounced a bad case of tuberculosis.

She was placed in the small local hospital of the town, and everything possible for the moment is being done to help the patient.

But writing to the Secretary of the National Sanitarium Association, the Secretary of the Board of Health asks: "Is it possible to make room for this patient in the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives. The local hospital is crowded for room, and there is really no place for this poor girl."

Continuing, the Fort William official adds: "I may say that as far as being able to pay is concerned, she, as far as we can learn, has no friends who can afford to pay for her in an institution."

It is to meet just such cases as these that the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives has been opened.

The official reports of the past year show that more than half the patients who entered the institution were absolutely free—their maintenance not costing them a single farthing. The others only paid a nominal sum ranging from \$1.50 to \$8.00 a week, only a few paying the larger amount. The average of each patient was less than 50 cents a day. The actual cost of maintenance to the institution is over \$9.00 a week so that our readers can readily see how strong a case is made out by the Trustees in their appeal to make provision for just such a patient as that from Fort William—only one of scores who are constantly seeking admission.

MAYOR KENNEDY CONTRADICTED.

(Toronto News, Saturday, Dec. 14.)

Mayor Kennedy's letter in your issue of yesterday is a glaring contradiction of the testimonies given by other and equally competent authorities, who are perhaps less selfishly interested in what they have to say as to the result of local option in Owen Sound. After local option had been in force in that town for seven months I was in Owen Sound, and interviewed the Mayor, who was then in office. Mr. Joyce said, "If you want to see what local option has done already for Owen Sound go down our business streets and look in at the store windows and you will see what we have never seen before in this town. You will find that in almost every window there are advertisements reading, 'Men Wanted.' And this was in the winter when it is usual for men to be dismissed by hundreds because of the slackness of business."

He told me also that Hon. A. G. MacKay, M. P., had recently been in his store, and had said to him, "I now see my mistake in opposing local option. I confess, since seeing what local option has done for Owen Sound local option has done for all over this Province." He also said, "Right across the street from my store is a butcher shop, and the butcher told me the other day that poor women, the wives of drunkards, used to come to his store with five or ten cents in their hands on Saturday night to buy a bone with a little meat on it so that they might get a taste of meat one day in the week, but since local option came into force these very same women came to him with five-dollar bills in their hands to buy nice joints of meat."

The Rev. Mr. McAlpine told me that the Chief of Police had said that there was not one drunk in a hundred compared with license conditions. This same Chief also said that there used to be a string of women coming to him begging him to protect them from their drunken husbands, but that since local option had been enforced he had not received one such caller. Bankers, dry-goods merchants, grocers, and boot and shoe men, jewelers, and all classes of business men declared that business was marvelously improved by the change.

I have not space to tell all that was then said, and from the testimony of disinterested parties the better conditions are largely the same to-day. If there has been any change for the worse since then, who is to blame? Who but the violators of the law? Liquor men have made Owen Sound their Waterloo, knowing that if they could discredit local option there they would discredit it in many another place. They have left no stone unturned to make local option a failure, and then they point to the results of their conduct and say: "There is local option for you." But notwithstanding all their nefarious conduct it is evident to every impartial observer that even in Owen Sound local option is still a great blessing to all law-abiding citizens.

In nearly all towns and cities it has been difficult to enforce prohibition at first, such as, for instance, Kansas City, Portland and Grand Forks, but after a while the recalcitrant citizens have been hunted to

earth and now prohibition in these very towns is a glorious success. And so it will be in Owen Sound. Let the friends of local option stand by their guns. Let them fearlessly fight the traffic that mothers nine tenths of the crime and poverty and misery of civilized nations, according to the testimony of Lord Coleridge, Baron Fitzgerald and others, and there will be a reward such as those only who fight for the uplifting of their race can ever attain.

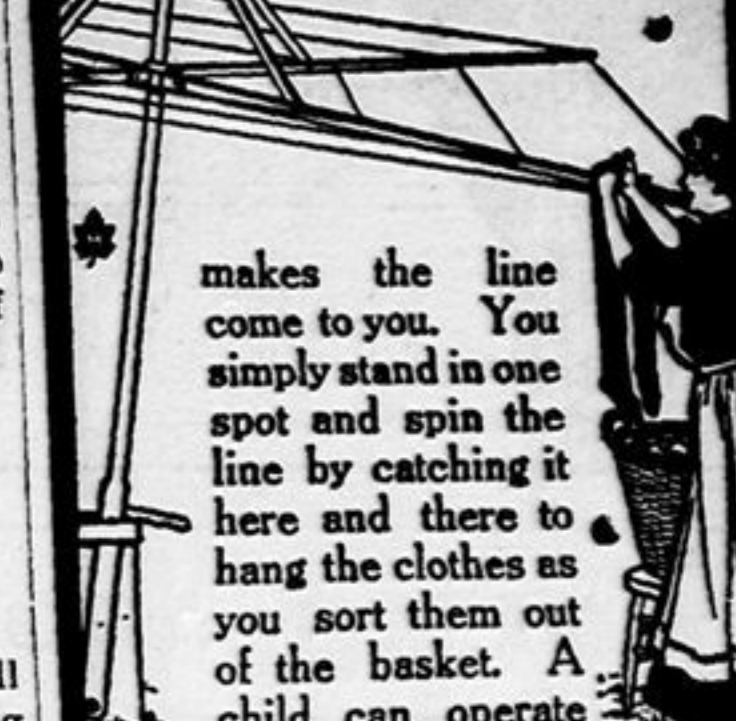
