Mr. M. K. Richardson spent part of last week and over Sunday with members of his family in Toronto.

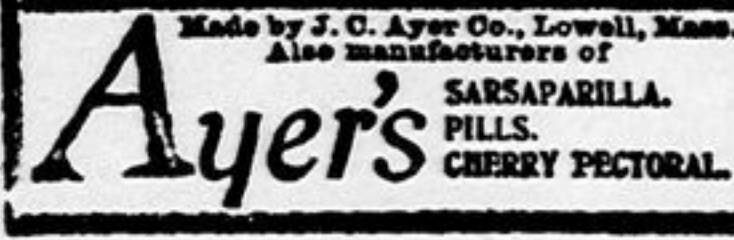
Mrs. W. H. Thurston has been visiting Kimberly friends for some days.
