SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts.
