CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION

Continued from page 1. rural mail and parcel post development and the appropriation of ten million dollars for Agricultural Education. He regretted the Senate had thrown out the Good Roads Bill.

Hon. Arthur Meighen, Solicitor-General in the Dominion Cabinet, remarked in his introduction that a great deal of history has been written since his former appearance here two and a half years ago.

We emerged from the fight for reciprocity and enjoy untrammelled freedom to legislate as we will. Reciprocity is dead to some, but not dead to others, and if the advocates of the past feel disposed to resurrect it as an issue in a similar contest the election cannot come on too soon to suit the Conservative party. Sir Wilfrid Laurier deceived the people of the west for fifteen years, he said, and gave as an example the Hudson's Bay Railway. He was always promising, but failed in the fulfilment of his promises. Nothing was done, beyond the making of a few useless surveys. Since the Borden Government came into power two and a half years ago, one hundred and fifty miles of the road have been already constructed. Methods have been perfected for preserving the identity of grain, the best elevator in the world has been erected at Fort William, and others are under construction at Moose Jaw and Saskatoon. This relieves to a large extent the difficulties the farmers had in not being able to take off their immense crops and having them moved speedily from the threshing mill to the market.

He demonstrated wherein great losses, amounting to millions of dollars, were the result of mismanagement and blundering over the new transcontinental railway; he referred to the attitude of the late Hon. A. G. Blair, who objected to the road, and regarded the estimated cost away below what it would be. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, he said, had often pointed with pride to the Grand Trunk Pacific as the great monument of his political life, but he doubted if any Conservative would care to have a monument so loaded with debt, extravagance and blunderings. It is to-day "the blackest cloud that overhangs the destiny of Canada," said Mr. Meighen, "and to overcome the blunders of the transcontinental by the Liberal party is the greatest difficulty of the present administration."

He compared the plans of the two parties on the naval policy over which there was such a strenuous fight last session, and deplored the fact that the Commons of Canada, who voted a grant of \$35,000,000, should have been defeated by the Senate. By referring to the difficulties experienced by the Liberals in trying to man the Rainbow and the Niobe, he inferred the futility of trying to man two fleet units with all Canadians, and impressed upon his audience the advisability of working unitedly with the mother country. Mr. Meighen is a comparatively young man, born, we believe, at St. Marys, has lived for some years as a successful barrister in Portage La Prairie, and is one of the most earnest, convincing and effective speakers to-day in the House of Commons.

THE FARMERS' CLUB.

The Glenelg Centre Farmers' Club held a very successful meeting at the township hall on Monday night last, when 120 members and their friends enjoyed a number of profitable discussions and listened with pleasure to the musical and other entertainment. Mr. John O'Neill, who is only young as a public speaker, made a remarkably good showing on his able address on "Success in Life." The idea of personal responsibility, personal integrity, care and economy in all right directions were pressed home on the audience. The address was much appreciated, and the general feeling was that ere long Mr. O'Neill will develop into a forceful debater and an earnest, forceful speaker.

Mr. F. Purdy, of Artemesia, near Ceylon, spoke at some length on the work of the Agricultural College, laying considerable stress on the advantages of the short courses. He spoke from experience, having recently taken up the work, which he recommended highly to all who can avail themselves of the privilege of attending.

The President, Mr. T. H. Binnie sang a couple of songs in his usual free and easy style. The next meeting will be held on March 12.
