SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS. THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent), on certain conditions. Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3 per acre. Duties.—Six months residence in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and 50 acres extra cultivation. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. W. W. 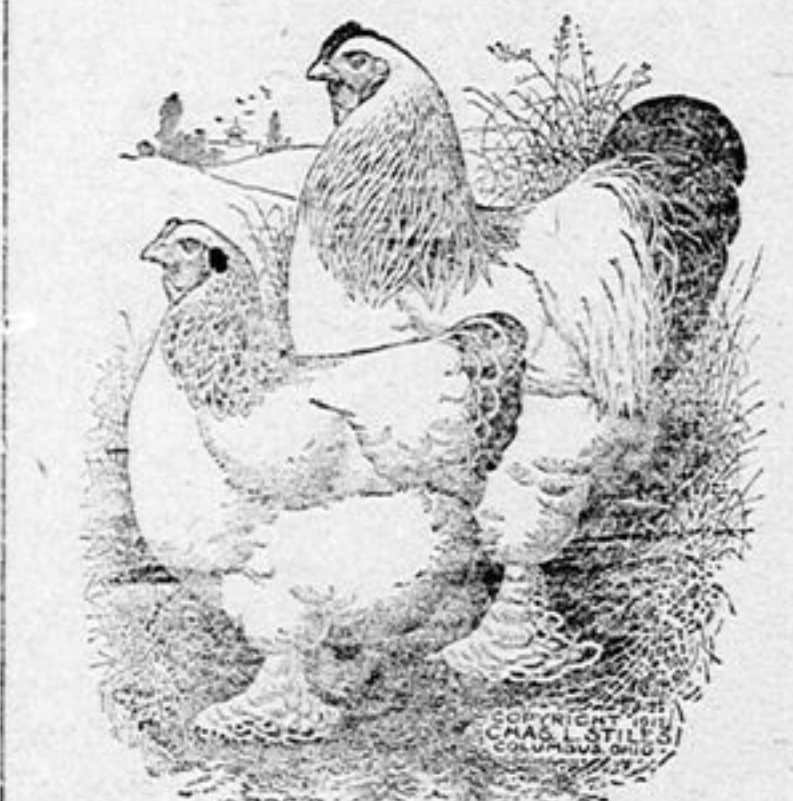

A LETTER FROM EDMONTON

Edmonton, Alta., March 10, 1914. To the Editor of The Chronicle:

Dear Sir,—I notice it is about time for me to pay my subscription, but my better half assures me she could not live without The Chronicle, I thought as there is a shortage of the feminine persuasion in the Wild and Woolly West and as prudence is the better part of valor, I had better comply with that outward cheerfulness usually displayed by the average married man who has fought the good fight and has come off second best.

We have had a very mild winter, there being only about two weeks of cold weather. Edmonton is destined to become the wholesale house for the great Peace River Country, and that, I should judge, at no distant date. The steel on the Edmonton, Dunvegan & B.C. railway has now reached Lesser Slave Lake, and is being laid at the rate of two miles per day, while the contract for the first 125 miles of the A. & G.W. railway has been let, and work will soon commence thereon. On the Edmonton, Dunvegan & B. C. railway, they expect to have the grading done by next fall to the Peace River, while on the G.T.P. they fully expect to get the remaining gap connected up by June of this year. The C.N.R. are also making desperate strides in the race to the Coast. It usually takes three construction gangs to make one gang in this western country, that is: one gang on the job one gang coming in to go on a prolonged drive, and one gang going out to commence work again after having "hit the high places" for two or three weeks in the city. It is indeed a puzzling question, this liquor question, as the city seems at times to have waves of drunkenness something dreadful to witness, and the licenses keep on increasing at a desperate rate. Hard times or good times seem to make no difference.

Edmonton, along with all the rest of the western cities, has had very quiet times for the last 18 months, owing to the money stringency, but I should judge it must be nearly over, as quite a number of people have arranged loans for building large blocks at very satisfactory terms and rates. Prince Rupert, with the completion of the G.T.P., will very soon come into its own, and it is the writer's humble opinion that that hamlet will become the Liverpool of Canada, as they have the best harbor on the North American coast, and being that China and Japan are just beginning to develop. This port is right on the coast, and having water harbor all the year round, and some 60 feet deep right to the very edge, and

large enough for ocean liners for all time to come. Then, its situation as the terminal of the G.T.P., which is one of the best-built roads in Canada, if not the very best, and by which a locomotive unaided can haul some four times as much by the Yellow Head Pass across the Rockies as the same engine unaided could by way of the C.P.R. route over the Rockies. With the completion of the Panama Canal these British Columbia and Alberta cities will receive great advantages.

I notice that your worthy correspondent for Corner Concerns does not lubricate your columns with his skillful pen as frequently as he used to do. Possibly married life on his ranch is bringing him to that state described by Shakespeare as the "seer and yellow leaf" before his time. With these few rambling remarks, and wishing you, Mr. Editor, the success and happiness you so justly deserve, I remain, Herbert Wilkinson, Edmonton, Alberta.

RURAL ROUTE NO. 4

Tenders are asked for couriers over Rural Mail Route No. 4, running east and south from Durham, the distance being nine and three-eighths miles, and minutely described as follows: "The courier will leave Durham after receipt of mail after arrival of the G. T. R. train No. 213, now due at 2 p.m., and proceed east one and three-quarter miles on Lambton street to the roadway between concessions two and three, thence south two and one-eighth miles to the town line between Glenelg and Egremont, thence east one mile to the base line between the old and new surveys of the township of Glenelg, thence north one and one-eighth miles to the roadway between lots sixty-three and sixty-four, thence west one and seven-eighths miles to a given road, thence north three-quarter miles to Lambton street, thence west three-quarter miles to Durham post office.

By this change from our original outline it will be noticed that patrons along the given road past Wm. Smith's and Henry Lawrence's will not be served till the return trip, instead of the outgoing trip, as formerly. Also, patrons on Lambton street, now Rural Route No. 4, will be served by the courier of No. 4, and the courier of Route No. 1 will be changed so as to go out by way of Durham Road instead of by Lambton street. It is expected that Route No. 4 will be in operation by the first of May.
