"Yes, but what does it mean?" she asked, turning to the table again.

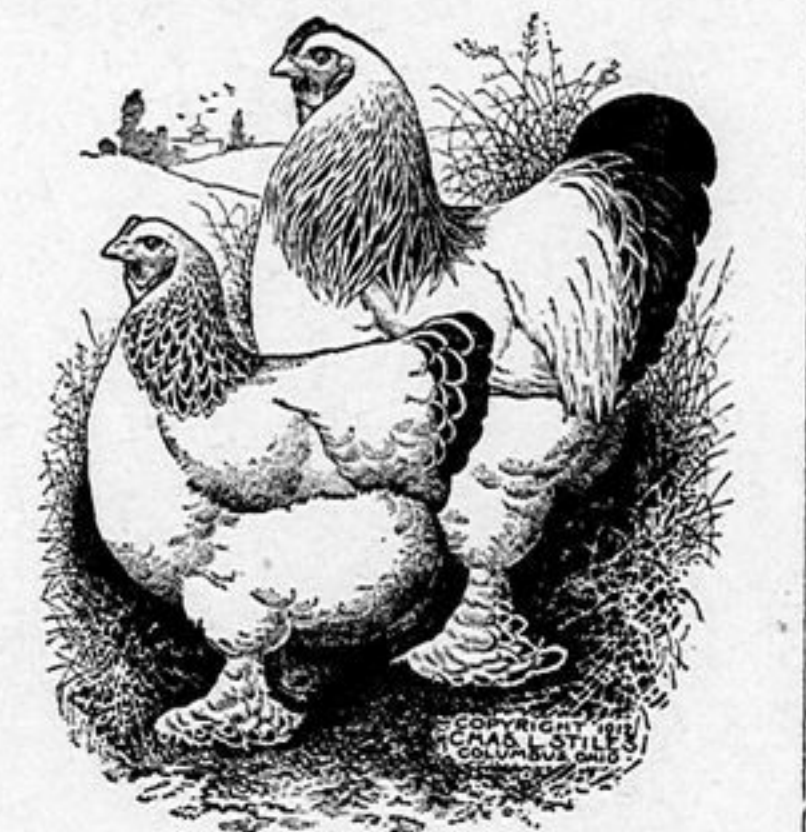
