Sounds Made by Earthquakes. Earthquake sounds are described as ! variations of heavy rumbling so low in pitch as almost to be more felt than heard (in many cases inaudible to persons who are deaf to very low tones) and belonging to one or another of the following types: The passing of wagons, thunder, wind, the fall of a load of stones, the fall of a beavy body, an explosion or some other miscellaneous sound. In strong earthquakes the sound area occupies a central region (on an average two-thirds) of the disturbed region; in moderate earthquakes the two areas are approximately of the same magnitude, while in many slight earthquakes the sound area is larger than the disturbed area. As a rule, the beginning of the sound precedes the shock, and the end of the sound follows the end of the shock.
