BLYTH'S CORNERS.

As announced in our last budget, Rev. Mr. Peckover, of Toronto, occupied the pulpits in Amos and Knox churches, on Sunday and preached a very able and inspiring sermon to well-filled houses, which was much enjoyed by all. What has happened your Knox Corner scribe? He made a very good start, and helped us out considerably. Hope he may rouse up a little.

Mr. Perry Hoeftin of Toronto ate his Easter eggs at the parental home and returned to the city the Monday following.

Messrs. Andrew Stewart and Geo. Seim are each building improvement houses in the early summer. Also Mr. Piery Cornish, while Mr. Jas. Blyth will build a sheep house, and possibly we may be able to build a hen-coop.

The meeting under the management of the Grange, on Saturday night, which R.J. Ball, M.P., was invited to attend to talk over Parliament matters, was quite a success. When having Mr. Ball was proposed, a few of the members thought it nonsense to ask him to come when possibly only a few would be present, but instead, a fairly well-filled house was present from six or seven miles in the vicinity of Varney. The principal object of the meeting was to lay before Mr. Ball the opinion of the Grange on the good roads movement, and to ascertain his bearings on the same. Mr. James Moore occupied the chair, in the absence of G.M. Leeson, unable to attend. Mr. Thos. McNiece was first called on, and dealt with the subject admirably. Ninety per cent of the farmers were opposed to this good roads movement, said he, and if the Government persisted in its extravagance to force this needless thing on the country not only "the boys" but the "old men" as well would be forced to abandon the farm.

The taxes were becoming extremely burdensome in our own township of Normanby, said he. It will require between \$75,000 and \$80,000 to build the bridges alone this year. Your humble scribe was next called on, and narrowly escaped turning turtle, but said, among other things, that if he could grow enough farm produce he could draw it over any road he has yet travelled and do his little share in reducing "the high cost of living" to a fragment in less than a year. Mr. Ball took the stand, and after complimenting the Grange for the many advantages derived from such an organization launched forth. He expressed great surprise at the stand taken against good roads, thought it queer for the farmers to refuse a gift of \$1,500,000, but just here Mr. Ball made a mistake. The farmers would gladly accept the gift if it ended at that, but it does not. They will be required to supplement that amount in a proportion of that to one, which would be, to say the least, extremely burdensome. Mr. Ball condemned the present mode of building roads and seemed to think the farmers were foolish in not accepting the Government proposal. He dealt at some length on the C.N.R. guarantee bonds and assured his hearers that the Government would secure itself to get this money back with interest.

On the steel bounty question he did some fancy skating and quoted Hon. Mr. White as saying in the House that on no ground should any industry receive any bounty after it is once thoroughly established, but instead raise the tariff. A listener at this point asked Mr. Ball what was the difference between granting a bounty or raising the tariff to protect the iron and steel industries, which was not difficult to answer, but which is in effect just a cunning way of pulling the wool over the people's eyes. At the close a hearty vote of thanks was given Mr. Ball after which the meeting was closed with singing the National Anthem.

John Edgecumbe, said to be the oldest librarian in number of years of service in Ontario, died at Walkerville, aged 77.
