Joe Kelly, charged with selling liquor at the Pacific Hotel, Owen Sound, was invited to attend court on the 23rd of May, 1911, but refused to accept the invitation and skipped out. The trial went on just the same and Joe, who had a previous charge registered against him, was convicted.
