Forest and two sisters, Martha, and Mrs. Chubb, of Edmonton, also survive.

Joe Kelly, charged with selling liquor at the Pacific Hotel, Owen Sound, was invited to attend court on the 23rd of May, 1911, but refused to accept the invitation and skipped out. The trial went on just the same and Joe, who had a previous charge registered against him, was convicted. Inspector Beckett kept on the lookout for his man, and hearing he was serving time in Toronto on a similar charge and would be liberated on Saturday morning, went to Toronto with the warrant, met Kelly at the jail gate, had him re-arrested, took him to Owen Sound Saturday and lodged him in jail, where he will spend the next four months.

Thomas Ward, an Englishman, who has been in Canada only a short while and who does not like the ways of the country, undertook on Saturday night last to wreck Eaton's store, Toronto, in order to secure deportation. About 10.30 o'clock, armed with bricks, stones and pieces of iron, he broke three large plate glass windows near the main entrance on Yonge street. He appeared before Magistrate Demison on Friday and said he wanted to be deported, but was discharged with advice. He said he would be back again, and was true to his word. Instead of being sent home, however, he was sent to the penitentiary for two years.
