NEWS FROM EVERYWHERE

South Wellington Conservatives renominated H.C. Schofield, M.P.P.

Fourteen lives were lost in the wreck of Halifax Lightship No. 19.

South Brant Conservatives nominated W. S. Brewster, M.P.P.

Italian marines were landed to guard King William of Albania.

North Brant Conservatives nominated J. Westbrook, M.P.P.

Dr. Jessop, M.P.P., has served papers for alleged libel against the St. Catharines Journal.

Sir Francis Laking, one of the royal physicians, is dead in London, aged 67.

Princess Ludwig flew the English Channel in a biplane to keep her social engagements in Paris.

Fire on Sunday destroyed several stores and dwellings at Marmora.

James Fallis, M. P. P., is again the candidate of Peel Conservatives.

Wm. Ruttan, the Muskoka murderer, surrendered to the police Saturday morning.

The mangled body of John Simpson of Elora was found on the railway track.

Jennie Myers, aged 9, of Hamilton, was perhaps fatally burned by fireworks.

Capt. H. A. Machin, M.P.P., has been renominated by Kenora Conservatives.

West Northumberland Conservatives nominated Geo. Greer, ex-receiver of Cobourg, for the Legislature.

Sir Francis Belsey, politician and philanthropist, is dead in London, aged 77.

The British Government finally decided not to participate at the Panama-Pacific Exposition.

The U.S. Supreme Court limits the liability to damage of the owners of the Titanic, to \$91,000.

E. A. Zeller of Hensall was chosen last week as the Liberal candidate for the Provincial Legislature in South Huron.

An \$8,000 fire occurred in Windsor, the 20th inst., caused, it is supposed, by a small explosion of natural gas.

Hon. Martin Burrell dined the Mexican mediators at Niagara Falls, and tendered a welcome to Canada.

The police force of London, Ont., may resign in a body if their request for one day off in seven is not heeded.

Capt Hugh McCullough has been appointed Registrar for West Northumberland, to succeed F. W. Field resigned.

A Vancouver jury convicted Jack Kong, a Chinese boy, who killed his employer, Mrs. Millard, of manslaughter.

A new Conservatives' Association to represent the new constituency of Windsor, has been formed with Fred Reid as president.

The Mexican Constitutionalists have decided to rush a delegate to the Mediation Conference at the Falls.

The Irish Home Rule Bill passed its third reading in the British House of Commons by a majority of 77.

South Wellington Liberals endorsed Mayor Carter, of Guelph, already nominated for the Legislature by independents.

Wm. Warner, an aeronaut, fell 1,000 feet into Lake Erie on Sunday afternoon at Cleveland, and was drowned.

The Labor Educational Association of Ontario, met at St. Thomas, elected W. Stokes president, and passed a resolution favoring labor candidates for Parliament.

An early election was announced by Hon. Dr. J. O. Reaume, at the organization meeting of the new Windsor Conservative Association.

The Royal liner, Royal Edward, which grazed an iceberg in the St. Lawrence on Saturday, had her stem twisted a little, and is taking a little water in the fore-hold.

David Orr, a farmer of Ringold, was caught under his automobile when he lost control of it at Chatham, and it overturned, and he was drowned in two feet of water in the ditch.

Dr. H. R. McCullough succeeds Dr. S. M. Henry, elected mayor of Harrison, as medical health officer, and John Meiklejohn takes his place as a member of the Board of Education.

John Hoole, aged 14, of Chatham, was struck by an auto, and while a wound in the face was being treated in the hospital he was seized with an epileptic fit and choked to death.

Two of the three bandits who held up, robbed and murdered John Wilson, paymaster of the Canada Cement Company at Exshaw, Alberta, have been arrested, and all the money taken from Wilson has been recovered.

Capt. Bernier, the Canadian Arctic explorer, who made three Government expeditions on the steamer Arctic in search of the North Pole, is about to start on his second private expedition to arctic fur trading with the Eskimos.
