THE sole head of a family, or iny male over 18 years old may nomestead a quarter-section of evailable Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands lgency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent), on certain conditions.

Duties .- Six months residence apon and cultivation of the land n each of three years. A hometeader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at east 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required in every case, except when vicinity.

20 Oct. 19. November 16, Dec. 21. steader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3 per acre. Duties .- Six months residence in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and 50 extra cultivation. A homesteader who has exhaust-

ed his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3 per acre. Duties.-Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth
