SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Germany Must Win Soon or Loose All

Herman A. Metz, Congressman from the Tenth District of Brooklyn, former City Controller of New York and head of one of the biggest firms importing from Germany in the country, made the direct assertion to the Brooklyn Eagle that the German army must be in Paris in 60 days or else Germany must give up hope of being victor in the present warfare against all Europe.

"I look for a great, big smash within a very short time," said Mr. Metz. "It will come suddenly, and then everybody will see what it means and get some sense. Then, maybe, they'll call this thing off. For if the war isn't ended within the next few months, or within a very short time, it is bound to last for years. And what its cost will be no man can tell, no person can have even the remotest idea."

Mr. Metz made this assertion about the dire necessity, as far as Germany is concerned, for a quick termination of the warfare in which the German Empire has become embroiled, in the course of an interview, in which he paid his respects to the "news" of the battles which the American newspapers are publishing, and in which he gave a brief, but telling analysis of German motives and German hopes.

"This war," he said, "isn't something new. It almost broke out two years ago when Germany and France had that trouble over Morocco. It was only a miracle that prevented the war then. It was averted by even less than a hair's breadth. But they knew that the war was only postponed. They knew that they'd have to deal with exactly the situation they've got now. They had it all mapped out. They knew exactly what they would do. They knew exactly who were the people they'd have to fight."

Told Him Two Years Ago Just How It Would Be To Day

"Bless your heart, man, Germany hasn't gone into this thing with her eyes shut. I was over there, in Germany, just about the time they had that trouble two years ago. They gave me a dinner—some of the really big people of the Empire were there. They told me about this. They told me two years ago just exactly what was going to bring about the situation that exists now in 1914. They told me just how the nations would be lined up. It has all come out as they told me—as they knew it would have to come out, and as nothing in the world could stop it from coming out.

Expected to Loose Warships and make France Pay for Them

"England," they told me, "will beat us on the sea. England will probably blow our fleet to smithereens. But every warship of ours that the British fleet blows out of the water France will have to pay for it all. France will be the goat. The reason? There wouldn't be any need to consider the certainty of this war if it weren't for France."

"That's what they told me two years ago," continued Mr. Metz. Events have worked out exactly as they were predicted then.

"Germany has gone into this war simply because she had to—because there was nothing else she could do. Anybody who says this matter has been brewing just because of Serbia and Austria is a fool. He doesn't know anything. He's just as much of a fool as the man who thinks we are getting the news of this war right now."

Dutch River Boats to Take German Products down the Rhine

"What's the use of talking about the capture of such a place as this? It doesn't count any more than does this talk about Germany making war on Holland. My heavens, the Germans aren't fools! Get out your map and see what peace with Holland means to Germany right now. You'll see that the Rhine gets out to sea that way. Do you know what is the significance of that?
