NEWS FROM THE U.S.A.

Colorado wants 12,000 cars for the shipment of her fruit.

The United States has refused to recognize Mexican Constitutional postage stamps as legal.

Harry Mandell of Williamsburg was stabbed at Greenpoint by striking painters whom he had refused to join.

Peaches are so plentiful in Warren county, New Jersey, that growers are having difficulty in marketing the crop.

It is announced that the Porto Rican-American Tobacco Co. will build a \$50,000 plant at Perth Amboy.

In 1909 Anne Tutone gave her age as 20 to the Brooklyn marriage license clerk. Now in 1914 it is still 20.

An unidentified man with a bullet hole in his temple was found dead on a bench near the elephant house in the Bronx Park.

It is proposed to hold the fur auctions, which have previously been held in London, in New York, because of the war situation.

While trying to leap from her father's barge to one moored alongside, Nancy Olsen fell into the Hudson River and was drowned.

His mind affected by the heat John Finnegan, a baker, committed suicide by jumping from the window of his room in New York city.

Lemons condemned and dumped into the sea a month ago are reappearing in Coney Island lemonade, according to the health inspectors.

Laden with 11,000 tons of food-stuffs for England and with her four 6-inch guns swathed in tarpaulins, the Adriatic left New York for Liverpool.

Thieves chloroformed Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin A. Kinsie, a Flat-bush, N.Y., couple, and then decamped with \$75 in cash and a gold watch and chain valued at \$125.

According to the report of Oscar A. Janes, adjutant-general of the Grand Army of the Republic, there are 173,335 members in good standing in the organization. The loss on account of death in 1913 was 11,187.

The widow of a white man murdered under revolting circumstances by a negro, at Starkville, Miss., will spring the murderer's trap, not an uncommon procedure in the district.

New York glove cutters have joined the strike begun by their fellow workers in Gloversville and Jamestown, N.Y., several days ago. The strike now involves 10,000 workers.

Because she removed her hat in a New York cafe, and refused to put it on again when requested to do so, Mrs. Florence Witte was denied food and now sues the proprietor of the cafe for \$5,000.

A memorial buoy has been placed to mark the position of the old frigate, Mindend, in Baltimore harbor. "The Star Spangled Banner" was written on board the Mindend.

The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals has issued a statement urging purchasers of coal to buy now and save the horses from danger during the period of slippery streets and deep snow.

When the Ridgewood, N.J., police were notified that a young man had been killed on the Erie railroad tracks, Sergeant James E. Hulihan was sent to investigate and discovered that the victim was his own son.

"I never thought that beautiful instrument could utter such unmusical sounds," said pretty Mrs. Ethel Lorraine, of Jersey City, who is suing her husband for divorce, alleging that he spends all his time apart from business, fiddling.
