The council met September 12, pursuant to adjournment, all the members present the reeve in the chair; minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications from the following persons and firms:

Thos. J. Coleman and A. L. Walker, re work on town line G & A.; A. J. Mumford, for the J. I. Case Co.; W. H. Hall, for the Pedlar People; S. J. Parker, lists of occupied lands, and advertised list to be sold for arrears of taxes; Board of Trade, Owen St re county-wide contribution for war purposes, and from the Municipal World, on-account.

McMillan-Young-That the account of the Municipal World of \$6.85 for supplies be paid.—Carried.

Lindsay-McMillan-That A. L. Walker be paid \$1.25, half cost of repairing the road at lots 96 and 97 town line G. & A.—Carried.

Lindsay-Young-That collector of taxes for 1914 be appointed as follows: Ward 1 Thos. McGirr; Ward 2 A. B. McLellan; Ward 3 M. Quillinan; Ward 4, J. Ellison, jr.; and that their salary be \$25 each.—Carried.

Lindsay-Young-That Colin McArthur be paid \$2 for inspecting sheep killed by dogs.—Carried.

McMillan-Lindsay-That David Keyes be paid \$600, part payment on Morrison's bridge.—Carried.

Lindsay-McMillan-That gravel accounts be paid as follows: W. Matthews 60c., W. Tibbut \$1.20, H. McFadden, \$1.30, D. Symes 55c., D. McMillan \$4.15, J. Timmons \$1.70, Mrs. W. Britton \$7.50, P. Neill \$3.20, A. Middleton 55c., H. Patterson \$2.25, T. Tucker 50c., M. Norris 85c., J. Vasey \$2.15, A. Edge 70c. Total amount \$27.10.—Car.

Young-Peart-That T. Nichol be paid \$7.55 as follows: Two trips to Durham bridge \$3, three trips to Traverston bridge \$4, phone messages 55c.—Carried.

Peart-Young-That R. Lindsay and J. A. McMillan be paid \$1 each for committee work on Morrison's bridge.—Carried.

Peart-McMillan-That this council instruct the Clerk to intimate through the columns of The Chronicle, Review and Standard the method to be adopted by which the people of Glenelg may have an opportunity to join in the county-wide contribution of oats and potatoes to the men at the front, as suggested by the Owen Sound Board of Trade.—Car.

Peart-Young-That inspectors on Morrison's bridge be paid as follows: T. Nichol \$21, J. McMeeken \$3, J. McMillan \$1, N. McKinnon \$4, and that Donald McMillan be paid \$1 for work on Morrison's bridge.—Carried.

Lindsay-Young-That commissions on expenditure on Morrison's bridge be paid as follows: T. Nichol \$30.00, J. A. McMillan \$15.—Carried.

Lindsay-Young-That the clerk be paid \$20 on salary.—Carried.—The council adjourned to October 17 at 10 a.m.
