SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. PLACES WE READ ABOUT

The present war has brought us face to face with many cities and towns about which we know little or nothing. Though perhaps ignorant of their existence, and never having heard of many of them, they are places of considerable importance, and our readers will be glad to know something of their populations, industries, and other features. The information given herewith has been gleaned from Blackie's Modern Cyclopaedia, in eight volumes, published about 20 years ago, and reliable at the time, but a little out of date now.

ESSEN, in Germany, is a town known to many as the home of the Krupp Iron Works. It is 18 miles north-east of Dusseldorf, and was founded in the 9th century, when it was adorned with a fine church, dating back to 873. The population a few years ago was given at 65,000, but of late years it has increased rapidly. The Krupp Iron Works are the most extensive in Europe, covering about a thousand acres, and at the present time giving employment to 40,000 men. They are extensive manufacturers of war armaments and heavy artillery and have until recently supplied most of the armies of Europe. They are now busy night and day keeping up supplies for the German forces. We understand that a large portion of our cement mill machinery came from Krupp's.

OSTEND is a seaport of Belgium, 67 miles north-west of Brussels. It is situated on a sandy plain, and is protected against the sea by a solid wall of granite. Cod and herring fishing and the cultivation of oysters have been industries of considerable importance. It dates back to the 9th century. From the 4th of July, 1601, to the 28th of September, 1604, when it capitulated, it sustained a siege by the Spaniards. Population, about 30,000.

PRZEMYSL.—A town in Austrian Galicia, on the river San, 51 miles west of Lemburg and 140 miles east of Cracow. It has two ancient cathedrals, several cloisters, and was strongly fortified. Population about 25,000.

ANTWERP is the chief seaport of Belgium. It is on the Scheldt river about 50 miles from the open sea. It was strongly fortified, being completely surrounded on the land side by a semicircular inner line of fortifications, the defenses being completed by an outer line of forts. The cathedral, with a spire 400 feet high, is one of the most beautiful specimens of Gothic architecture in Belgium. It contains Rubens' celebrated masterpiece, "The Descent from the Cross," and "The Assumption." The other churches of note are St. James', St. Andrew's, and St. Paul, all enriched with paintings by Rubens, Vanduyck and other masters. Among the other edifices of importance are the exchange, the town hall, the palace, theatre, academy of fine arts and the picture and sculpture galleries. The harbor accommodation is excellent. The shipping trade was very large. The city had many and varied industries. It dates back to the 8th century and in the 11th and 12th centuries had attained a high degree of prosperity. In the 16th century it is said to have had a population of 200,000. The wars between the Netherlands and Spain injured the commerce, which was almost ruined by the closing of the navigation of the Scheldt by the Peace of Westphalia in 1648. Its prosperity revived during recent years, but the present war has again brought it to a state of comparative ruin, and may utterly destroy it. It had a population of more than 205,000 before the war.

LOUVAIN is 15 miles east of Brussels. It forms almost a perfect circle, nearly two miles in diameter, but the area is now too large for its population, and the town contains gardens and cultivable fields. Among the more noticeable public buildings are the Hotel de Ville, one of the richest and most beautiful Gothic buildings in the world, and the church of St. Peter, built at the end of the 14th century, an edifice of vast extent and rich in works of art. It has a university, formerly of European reputation, and up to recently was attended by 1,500 students. Population about 45,000.

LILLE (pronounced Leel) is a town in France, a chief fortress near the Belgian frontier. It is well built, has spacious, regular streets lined with large houses of brick and stone. The country adjacent is flat. It is the centre of an extensive commerce, the manufacture of linen and cotton thread and fabrics being the most important, but fine woollen cloth, velvets and carpets are also largely produced; in fact the factories of Lille cover almost the whole range of textile goods. Chemicals, leather, machinery, paper, beet sugar, etc., are turned out in large quantities. The population is about 190,000.

RHEIMS, a city of France, 82 miles east north-east of Paris, surrounded by vine-clad hills. The cathedral, erected in the 13th and 14th centuries, is one of the finest Gothic structures existing in Europe. Other noted edifices are the archiepiscopal palace (1498-1509) occupied by French kings on the occasion of their coronation; the church of St. Remy (11th and 12th centuries) the oldest church in Rheims; Port de Mars, a Roman triumphal arch, erected in honor

It was at one time in possession of the English, who were expelled by the Maid of Orleans in 1429. It was held by the Germans in 1870-71. Since then it has been strongly fortified. The population is about 100,000.
