SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Hanover, Ont., Nov. 19, 1914.

Dear Sir,— In a recent issue of many of the local newspapers, I notice an article written by Mr. H. H. Miller, Liberal ex-M.P., for South Grey, purporting to give a list of contributions to the Patriotic Fund, etc., by Hanover manufacturers, etc. Although the name of the Ball Furniture Co. Limited, of Hanover, was second on the list, I said firm having subscribed \$100, said firm and contribution does not appear. Why, Mr. Miller knows best. In a later issue, Mr. Miller attempted to make a correction, but in many of the newspapers, his article did not correct, partly because it consisted of only a few lines, the meaning of which was not clear, and I am satisfied it did not arrest the attention of most readers of the paper, and partly because it was so indefinite that the reader could not discern whether the contribution was an open-hearted, voluntary contribution, or whether it had been abstracted from the donors by pre-arrangement with the Ball Furniture Co., Ltd., sure. The Ball Furniture Co., Ltd., has a business connection over the Dominion of Canada, reaching from ocean to ocean, and until the publication of this article their patriotism, I am sure, was never questioned. But when this list of contributors was published as a complete list, a grave doubt was raised in the minds of those who knew them as to their loyalty. Our men, who represent us, and whose business it is to sell our goods, have been questioned by almost every dealer whom they solicited for orders, as to why the name of their firm did not appear in the list. Not having been home in the meantime, they were not in a position to put us right in the mind of the dealer. As these are days when "Made in Canada" is the slogan and the motive in publishing the list of contributors was undoubtedly to set Hanover right in the eyes of the business community, and further, as every member of the Ball Furniture Co. is of direct British descent and of the highest sense of justice to ourselves and in justice to the public, we should not be misrepresented either in the business or political world. We do not parade our loyalty before the public unnecessarily but at the same time we do not wish to have a wrong impression created in the minds of our Canadian fellow-citizens. Nor is it right that our business and political reputation should be injured, which it has been, the largest stockholder and manager of the firm being the Dominion Member for South Grey. Mr. Miller, who was chairman of the patriotic meeting, held in town of Hanover, not secretary nor yet treasurer, was only one of a publicity committee and was not particularly appointed reporter, but I presume took upon himself this duty and therefore should have reported correctly or not at all. And if he alone is responsible, he and he alone is responsible. Any attempt at correction cannot now place us where we ought to be, as little attention is paid to after explanations, and even this letter may fail to reach many of your readers. It seems rather strange that the Ball Furniture Company's name was the only one omitted.

Trusting you will give this explanation a place in your valued paper simply because many of your readers may have read the original, and kindly requesting any local papers which copied the former article to copy this, and oblige.
