SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

NORMANBY COUNCIL.

The members elect met in the township hall, Ayton, as per statute, on Monday, January 11, at 11 a.m. The clerk administered the declarations of office. The members then formed a council, as follows:

Reeve—Wm. H. Ryan. Deputy Reeve—J. Whiteford. Councillors—D. Fisher, R. Barbour, A. Filsinger.

The Reeve took the big chair and addressed the council at some considerable length, asking their co-operation of all the members, keeping in view that motto, "low taxes." He said if this was done, he, Mr. Ryan, would guarantee an acclamation for 1916. Mr. Ryan introduced By-laws Nos. 1, 2 and 3 of 1915, which were given their proper readings, and on motion of Whiteford-Filsinger were passed and engrossed in the By-law book.

Ryan-Filsinger—that Mr. Owens, ratepayer, be elected a member of the local board of health for three years—Carried. Ryan-Whiteford—that Mr. Andrew Schenk be asked to withdraw his letter of December 15, 1914, to the township council tendering his resignation as township engineer—Carried.

Whiteford-Barbour—that the prayer and petition of ratepayer James Marshall and others relative to the alterations of S.S. Nos. 14 and No. 1 be granted, and that the clerk give notices to all parties concerned as the School Act requires. That the Council will at the next meeting on February 10 pass by-laws giving effect to said petition and altering boundaries in accordance herewith—Carried.

Ryan-Whiteford—that at this first meeting of Council after the appointment of Dr. Jamieson as Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, we must heartily congratulate him on the honor conferred on him, and we are sure those who appointed Dr. Jamieson will find they have done themselves honor in said appointment—Carried.

Whiteford-Barbour—that Councillors Filsinger, Fisher and Ryan be a committee to report on conditions of the hotels in this township, for information of Council, committee to receive no pay—Carried.

Fisher-Whiteford—that Mrs. Walsh be re-appointed caretaker of the township hall at the same salary as formerly, \$10, payable half yearly in advance—Carried.

REAL ESTATE FIRM IS UNDER ARREST.

Five members of the real estate firm of McCutcheon Bros. were placed under arrest in Toronto on Friday last. There are numerous people in this vicinity to whom this will be good news—those who have got bitten by this firm. One gentleman near Flesherton sued last fall for the return of \$500 bound up with the firm, and several others have smaller amounts. The company has been doing business for several years, and no doubt their victims are widely distributed throughout the country. If other districts have been hit as hard as this section the firm should have been out of business with their pockets lined long ago.

It required the new Attorney-General, Hon. I. B. Lucas, to get after the McCutcheons, and he lost no time about it. He was right on the ground here and came in contact with their business methods, to their undoing. It did not take him long to get busy after assuming his new office. The arrest was ordered by the Attorney-General after nearly a month's investigation and the charge is conspiracy to defraud.—Flesherton Advance.
