SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. Several reports were dealt with besides eleven by-laws. The by-laws were as follows: By-law appointing a member of the Collingwood board of education; by-law appointing Robt. McKnight of Owen Sound a member of the Owen Sound board of education for three years; by-laws appointing trustees for the county to the school boards of Meaford, Durham, Chatsworth, Artemesia, Dundalk, and Markdale by-law appointing Messrs. W. Breese and J. Cochrane members of the judicial board of audit; by-law appointing G. D. Fleming and Walter Hastie county auditors; by-law providing for the licensing of junk shops and second hand shops; by-law naming member of board of examiners for East Grey.

To the members of the County Council of the County of Grey.

Gentlemen—Allow me to thank you and extend to each and every one of you my hearty appreciation for the honor conferred on me by the unanimous election to the Warden's Chair. In a large and important county such as this the position carries with it considerable responsibilities and I hope in this case that the recipient of this honor may measure up to your expectations and fill the position in the same able manner as his predecessor. I may assure you that the town which I have the honor to represent will very much appreciate the favor which you have conferred on its representative and in their behalf, I return to you a hearty vote of thanks for the position. As far as I am aware the work of this session will be very light and only routine business will engage your attention.

The County Treasurer's statement has been placed before you and you will notice that there is a necessity of practising as much economy as possible unless a further issuing of debentures or increase of county rate is contemplated. The suggestion of the treasurer for the disposal of part of the remainder of the present issue of the debentures should be acted on.

This county being largely an agricultural county and at present in a fairly prosperous condition, yet everything possible should be done to further extend and encourage agricultural operations and thereby increase the rural population. It is expected that during the year the Hydro Commission will extend one of their systems throughout the county, which should enable farmers in many instances to secure cheap power, and will also largely benefit manufacturers in the towns and villages within the county.

In the terrible war in which our Empire is at present engaged, further means of assistance will no doubt engage your attention. Since November session, incidents have occurred which forcibly remind us of the possibility of a further spread of the area of military operations and it is thereby hoped and expected that this county will be prepared to give in both men and money, that which is required of us.

As the building of county bridges is one of our large expenditures, I would suggest that the chairman of the Roads and Bridges committee or the county engineer should in every case ascertain and know the cost as nearly as possible of building any contemplated bridge and the contract given subject to that price. If this is done it will, no doubt, save considerable expense.

In conclusion, I hope to extend to each and every member of this County Council the courtesy and freedom of speech required of the chair and would earnestly ask your assistance and co-operation to make our deliberations conducive to the best interests of this great and important county.
