SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough-scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. DORNOCH.

On Friday last there passed away in his 73rd year, one of our most respected pioneers in the person of Duncan Blue, of the township of Sullivan. The deceased was in his usual health, and was engaged in the afternoon planting potatoes. He partook of supper as usual, but in a few minutes afterwards died suddenly of heart failure. He was born in Scotland, and when young came to Sullivan township and settled on the farm on which he died. His wife and son died some years ago, and only one daughter, Mrs. John Swiegar, survive. He was a devoted Presbyterian, and a regular attendant until recently of the Dornoch Presbyterian church. Interment took place Monday to Latona cemetery.

One of the fiercest storms ever known in this locality passed over here on Sunday afternoon. BRITISH PRISONERS IN GERMANY

From time immemorial prisoners of war have evoked pity and sympathy. The agony and humiliation of the British prisoners must be indescribably acute and galling. But from that state of suffering there can be no redress, it being part of the fortunes of war, but the lack of comforts and food stands in a different category. This want will grow in volume and intensity as the days go by.

As a result of an official organization having been created recently to carry parcels to the British prisoners in Germany, insuring proper transmission through a neutral carrier, the "Khaki" Magazine of Imperial House, Kingsway, London, has started a fund to supply food and comforts for those who have no relatives or friends to look after them, as it is known that these poor fellows are not getting a proper supply of food.

An appeal is made to you for Two Dollars only, as there are so many demands made upon you in other directions. This money will go for the direct benefit of the Prisoners, as there is no cost of transmission and no waste of any description, information having been established showing the kind of food and clothing, etc., which can be sent without confiscation by the German Government.

This appeal should get a large response, as there is no other fund which deals with this particular condition.

The "Khaki" Magazine and Cabled News Sheet was created primarily as a gift for the Overseas Soldiers, bringing them late news from their homes. It is now supplying, free of charge, in addition to the soldiers at the front, and in training, the various hospitals in England and France, as well as the grand old fleet. It is a purely patriotic endeavor and in no way commercial.
