SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. 

News of Old Ontario

Pembroke has now only two liquor stores.

A. W. Smith is Barrie's new clerk and treasurer.

Midland council has school debentures at 102.64%.

The death of Mrs. Herriot, sr., occurred in Luther, aged 92.

Matthew Wilkins, one of Orangeville's oldest citizens, died at the age of 88.

A young man in Prescott was fined \$50 and costs for assaulting a policeman.

Cecil Murray, aged 16 was drowned at Simcoe, through the sinking of an old boat.

Lawrence Gibbons of Gilford had six head of cattle accidentally poisoned with Paris green.

Capt. Angus McCauley, one of the best known of the old shipmasters, died in Midland last week.

John Goodison, founder and proprietor of the Goodison Thresher Co., died suddenly at his home in Sarnia.

John McKay, aged about 50 years, dropped dead while doing carpenter work on a boat in Collingwood harbor.

Seventy-five English children, orphaned by the war, will be brought to the Annie Anderson home at Stratford.

Wm. Michael, aged 82 years, of Hamilton township, fell dead directly after greeting a brother who had come to visit him.

Pembroke has 27 grocery stores, which The Observer considers a very fair showing for a town with a population of less than 8,000.

Thorold town council decided to go on with the construction of a sewerage system in St. Andrew's ward at a cost of \$25,000.

The old gas works at Simcoe, unused for years since natural gas was discovered, are being refitted and will be used as a storhouse.

The boiler in D. C. McKenzie's tannery at Dundalk blew up and made a complete wreck of the brick addition in which it was located.

Forty thousand trout fry from the Ontario Government hatchery at Hamilton have been deposited in Ewart's and Bell's lakes, west of Markdale.

At Smith's Falls sneak thieves took advantage of low water in the Rideau to plunder boathouses. Lowness of the water enabled them to crawl under doors.

Ernest Twigger, aged 20, a deck hand on the steamer Iroquois, was killed on the Cornwall canal. He was caught between the side of the boat and the coping.

Giving as his excuse that he wanted to join the Mounted Rifles, Howard Swartz of Berlin, pleaded guilty to stealing \$50 from his father's clothes.

At Orangeville, a copper cylinder for a soda water fountain in Alex. Walker's bottling works exploded. Fortunately no one was near it at the time.

For conducting a sale in Collingwood without an auctioneer's license, as required by a county by-law, J. A. McCabe was fined \$100 and costs.

The two-year-old daughter of Will Elack, Amaranth town line picked up her father's razor while he was engaged for a moment, and cut her fingers severely.

Daniel Paquette of McGregor, lost a valuable horse in a peculiar way. It rolled on its back between a pile of straw and a furrow and was unable to get up. Pigs attacked it, and its injuries were such that it had to be killed.

The Red Cross Column

All the information which is filtering through from Serbia shows how terrible are the horrors through which that gallant little ally is passing. The plague and suffering are unspeakable and amid all that is being done to ease the lot of our wounded soldiers and of their French and Belgian comrades it is right also to remember the claims of the Serbs who are fighting so gallantly against vastly superior numbers. Before the Serbian people had time to recover from the exhaustion of the two Balkan wars they were plunged into the present struggle, with the result that at first the most essential medical appliances as well as drugs for the relief of the wounded were totally lacking.

This want has been supplied in some degree, but there remains an urgent need for money in order that medical and surgical supplies may be sent with all possible haste. Again and again we are assured by those who are working in Serbia that if it were possible for Canadian people to see the pitiable condition of their wounded Serbian allies, they would be instantly moved to render aid. Already the urgent appeal has reached the hearts of the Canadian people and a number of societies and individuals have generously donated money to the Serbian Red Cross and Relief Fund.

Serbia comes to us not merely in a general appeal to our generosity and charity, but she comes as a nation to which we owe a very great debt. While in time we are going to drive the hordes of barbarous invaders from the soil of France and Belgium, we must never forget that the first brunt of the fight was not borne by the great nations, but by the small nations of Europe.

Serbia cries out in the throes of a dreadful tragedy and her cries reach to the American continent. While we are assisting our Belgian Allies and French comrades we must not forget that Serbia has fought with a magnificent bravery and determination against the most dreadful odds, and while ravaged by a dread disease. Canadians were ever ready to help when assistance was needed and never was it needed as it is to-day in the little kingdom of Serbia.

These supplies may also be sent to 77 King street, E. Toronto, and marked "Serbia."

RED CROSS NOTES

The following official announcement has been issued by the Canadian Red Cross Society: The Canadian Red Cross Commissioner cables under date, May 15 stating that the Red Cross Society must refuse to accept shipments of goods designated for any special hospitals or officers as they are unable to guarantee delivery under present war conditions. The Canadian Red Cross has endeavored to comply with the wishes of individuals and other societies as far as possible by forwarding designated goods, but in view of the cable quoted above the society is compelled to give notice that from this time no goods can be received at its offices addressed to particular hospitals or officers.

The public is assured, however, that every Canadian officer commanding a medical unit in connection with the Canadian troops has been requested to draw upon the general stock of Red Cross goods, goods for the use of his hospital or ambulance.

The Canadian Red Cross Society now has depots in England and two or more places in France, from which goods are distributed by electric motor lorries. The society is therefore in a position to distribute goods to all Canadian hospitals and it calls upon the Canadian people to supply the goods which the wounded and
