FAIR GROUNDS WILL BE BLAZE OF LIGHT.

The electrical arrangements for the Canadian National Exhibition should prove a pleasant surprise for visitors to the grounds. The handsome Gooderham Fountain has been equipped with colored lights, submerged in the fountain. that will flash and play on the falling waters in a manner that will greatly enhance the beauty of the Grand Plaza. Flags of the Allies in colors will be stretched visitor at Mr. W. A. Armstrong's across the roof of the Manufacturbrilliantly illuminated. Another new feature will be the strings of colored globes strung about the grounds in all directions, while an artificial moon has been erected north of the grandstand in the outdoor agricultural section. 
