**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

**FLESHERTON.**

Another of the pioneers of Artemesia has passed away in the person of Mr. Alexander Stewart, who died at the home of his son-in-law, Mr. A. M. Gilchrist, on Thursday, August 26, at the ripe age of 79 years, 11 months. He was a man with robust health until about two years ago, when seized with a paralytic stroke, which left him in an enfeebled condition. Over a year and a half ago he suffered a severe blow by the death of his beloved wife. He then gave up his home here and since lived with members of his family, by whom he was cared for in the most affectionate manner. To his large and highly esteemed family he was a kind and devoted father. In the community he was highly respected. His integrity, kindness as a neighbor and cheerful disposition were characteristics of his life. In politics he was a staunch Liberal. Mr. Stewart was a native of Inverness, Scotland. When a young man he came to Canada, and for some time lived at Brampton, where he was married nearly 57 years ago, and immediately after came with his bride to Artemesia and settled on the west back line, where he farmed with success until 12 years ago when, succeeded by his son, John, he retired to a comfortable home in this village. He is survived by four sons and six daughters, viz., Mark and John, near Flesherton; William at Fort William, and Charles, at Kindersley, Sask.; Mrs. John Nixon, Mono Road, Mrs. John Thibaudeau and Mrs. Peter Thibaudeau, Markdale, Mrs. Donald McLeod, Mrs. Andrew Gilchrist and Mrs. Alex. McRae, Ceylon, all of whom were present at the funeral but Charles. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place to Flesherton cemetery on Monday afternoon, service being conducted at the house by the family pastor, Rev. A. McVicar, assisted by Rev. Mr. Matheson. The pall-bearers were five sons-in-law, and one nephew of the deceased. The family contributed an appropriate and beautiful floral offering, a sheaf of ripe grain in the form of a sickle.

With favorable weather, large congregations able sermons, good music and liberal contributions, the Methodist church reopening services on Sunday were very successful. Rev. Geo. Waugh of Dundalk, was the gifted preacher secured for the occasion and his eloquently delivered sermons pleased the congregations. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Dudgeon, assisted in the services and the venerable Rev. Peter Campbell of Maple, who was a visitor in the morning, also took part. Master Willie Norris of Toronto, the boy soprano, who possesses a sweet voice, sang with good effect, and the choir, assisted by other talent, rendered excellent music. The contributions and subscriptions given amounted to \$585. The entire cost of the renovation, including electric lights to be installed, is estimated at \$775. At a concert to be given this Monday evening, when home talent will be assisted by Mrs. Barton and Mrs. Peterson of Dundalk, it is expected the balance to be provided for will be covered. The interior of the church, which was last artistically decorated 19 years ago by the late W. H. Fleisher, again presents a new and attractive appearance, the job being done by the T. Eaton Company, decorators, Toronto. In the auditorium, the prevailing color on the ceiling is a rich cream, with artistic border and an elaborate design covers the upper end walls. The lower walls are finished in tiffany blend the somber shade harmonizing with the dark-grained woodwork and seats. A handsome new pulpit in natural grain, designed to match the organ, and the workmanship of Mr. Win. Large in the factory here, has replaced the old one. moved to the basement, and the pulpit and choir platforms have been carpeted anew. The basement is specially bright and inviting. The ceiling and walls have been finished in cream, with neat tenciling, and the woodwork throughout beautifully grained in light oak. The graining on the large doors at the front entrance of the church is a beautiful work of art.

A sad death occurred at the home of Mr. Thos. Sherwood, near Portlaw, on Wednesday night of last week, when his esteemed wife passed suddenly away with heart failure a few minutes after retiring. She had been in this village during the afternoon to consult a doctor, but though not feeling as well as usual, little anticipated the end of life so soon. Her sudden demise was a great shock to her husband and also to

her aged and feeble mother and family, all of whom have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement. The deceased was 52 years of age and was a daughter of the late Mr. Wm. Wright of the west back line. She was married 25 years ago to Mr. Sherwood, who survives her alone, their two children having died quite young. The funeral took place to Flesherton cemetery on Friday afternoon, and was largely attended. Service was held at the house, conducted by Rev. A. McVicar.

**FAIR GROUNDS WILL BE BLAZE OF LIGHT.**

The electrical arrangements for the Canadian National Exhibition should prove a pleasant surprise for visitors to the grounds. The handsome Gooderham Fountain has been equipped with colored lights, submerged in the fountain, that will flash and play on the falling waters in a manner that will greatly enhance the beauty of the Grand Plaza. Flags of the Allies in colors will be stretched across the roof of the Manufacturers' Building and at night will be brilliantly illuminated. Another new feature will be the strings of colored globes strung about the grounds in all directions, while an artificial moon has been erected north of the grandstand in the outdoor agricultural section. The sphere is eight feet in diameter, contains 1,800 globes, and when illuminated the supporting column will be invisible, giving the effect of a huge ball of fire hanging suspended in mid air. The interior of the buildings have been equipped with vacuum, or nitrogen lights of high power, and these will add greatly to the brilliance of the indoor illumination.

The grounds themselves never looked more beautiful. The floral arrangements are unsurpassed, while the lawns are a deep green and show no indication of the presence there this spring of the thousands of soldiers who were encamped over the winter.
