SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

SCOTCHTOWN BEEF RING ANNUAL MEETING

At the home of Mr. D. J. McArthur, on the evening of the 27th of September, was held the annual meeting of the Scotchtown beef-ring, when business for the past year was settled and the organization made for the season of 1916. During the season just closed there were 6,405 pounds of beef cut up and distributed amongst the members. This is from 16 animals which averaged 400 pounds each. The highest beef dressed 523, and the lowest 366 pounds. As all these animals were between two and three years of age, there must have been a difference in the methods of feeding to make the difference in dressed weight. All the members were well satisfied with the season's beef and continued in the ring for next year. Mr. D. J. McArthur kindly allowed the same place for slaughtering as formerly, and Mr. Thos. Turnbull will do the killing and cutting up for another year. The officers elected for next year were: President, A. McCuaig; secretary-treasurer, T. H. Binnie; auditors, Geo. Finney and Chas. Kennedy; inspectors, Thos. McKeown, A. Hooper and J. P. McMillan.

ARTHUR WOMAN BURNS TO DEATH.

Mount Forest, Oct. 2.—Mrs. Wm Little, an old and respected resident of the ninth concession of Arthur township was so seriously burned that she died in about three hours after the accident.

Mrs. Little lived with her son, Robert, on the old homestead, her husband having predeceased her last December. Robert had gone to a neighbor's threshing, and his wife had gone to the barn to feed some cattle, leaving the old lady in the house alone. On returning in some 15 or 20 minutes she was shocked to find the deceased's clothing burned off and the floor of the house on fire. She extinguished the fire, but was too late to save the old lady's life, as she never regained consciousness. It is supposed Mrs. Little's clothing caught fire from the stove and being in feeble health she was unable to make an alarm.

The Italian ministry of marine has issued an official statement announcing that 474 men and women lost their lives on the battleship Benedetto Brin, which was destroyed by an explosion in the harbor of Brindisi.

On receiving information to the effect that booty taken by the Germans at Lille, France, is being sold at a departmental store in Berlin, the French government has entered a protest with neutrals against such sales.

A London deputation, including Sir Adam Beck, went to Ottawa to confer with Sir Sam Hughes with a view to having all western Ontario troops trained in London in future, instead of having the soldiers divided up among towns and cities of the district.

FLESHERTON.

East Grey fair, held here on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week, though not in every respect up to some former years, met with a fair measure of success, and the directorate will have a balance on hand after meeting all obligations. The weather was ideal for the occasion, but on account of the delayed harvest by wet weather, farmers took advantage of the fine days to save the remainder of their crops, and the attendance at the fair was thereby interfered with. With the exception of a few lines, the exhibit in the hall was good, ladies' work being especially fine. On the field the show of horses was not up to former years, but there was a good exhibit in cattle, sheep and swine. A new feature was the exhibit of autos by Collingwood and Markdale firms. W. H. Thurston made a nice exhibit of grafonolas and entertained with pleasing music. In the farmer's speeding contest, D. McTavish won first, Leslie Chard second, and Fred Mathewson third. Best lady driver, Miss Oldham first, Miss Poole second. A baseball match between Ceylon and Rock Mills teams was won by the former, 9 to 7. During Wednesday afternoon splendid recruiting addresses were given, the speakers being Hon. Dr. Sproule, and Lieut. Mercer of Markdale, H. H. Miller, ex-M.P., of Hanover, and Capt. Brownlee and Lieut. Pojlock of Owen Sound. C. S. Cameron, M.P., of Owen Sound, presided. The Kilties' Band of Owen Sound entertained with inspiring and pleasing music. As a result of the Recruiting League's visit, seven recruits enlisted and passed the examination, as follows: Thos. Charl. Fred Bellamy, Chas. Adams, Alf. Holmes, Ernest Morgan, Ernie Smith and Johnson Howard. A few others who offered, failed to pass the examination.

The fair concert was very successful. A highly pleasing program was given by the four talented entertainers engaged for the night. They were, Mr. Kenny, comic, Miss Craig, elocutionist, Miss Eushnell, violinist, and Miss Wallace, pianist. Mr. Geo. Mitchell presided. The receipts at the grounds were \$132 and at the concert \$120.

After two weeks' illness, Mr. John Teeter, who had been for 25 years a resident of Artemesia, died at his late home on the east back line on Monday, September 27, aged 71 years. The largely attended funeral took place on Friday to Meaford road cemetery, the service being held at the house, conducted by Rev. Mr. Phalen of Markdale. McCallum of Edmonton, Price, at Wainwright, Alta., and Fred, at home.
