HON MARTIN BURRELL LAKES A HUGE ORDER FROM THE WAR OFFICE

Six and a Quarter Million Pounds of Canned Beef From Canada

Following previous announcements, the Honorable Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, has now issued a statement, conveying the information that the War Office has accepted tenders from the packers for six million and a quarter pounds of canned corned beef for delivery before the close of the current year.

It will be remembered that Mr. Burrell has not undertaken to purchase the meat for the War Office, but through the Acting High Commissioner, Sir George Perley, has conveyed to the Imperial Government, the tenders of the packers, this representing the aggregate of the offer of those engaged in the tinned meat business.
