GLENELG COUNCIL

The council met November 13, pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications as follows: T. J. Hannigan, Hydro Electric Railway, Canada Bond Corporation, re Debentures issue. Geo. E. Peart, Thos. Turnbull, and M. McInnis, reports on road expenditures. By By-law no. 1000, nominations, and by-law no. 1001, appointing road officers was introduced and read a first and second time.

Young—Peart. That by-law no. 1002 be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed on by-law book. Carried.

McInnis—Young. That by-law no. 1003, appointing George Campbell and Logan McCormick road officers be now read a third time, signed, sealed, and engrossed on by-law book. Carried.

Turnbull—Young. That Doye grainwage be paid \$2.90 for gravel. Carried.

Peart—Turnbull. That cheques be issued for ward appropriations and statute labor as follows: ward 1, appropriation, \$81.25; ward 2, appropriation, \$71.00; ward 3, appropriation, \$68.00; ward 4, appropriation, \$36.25; ward 5, appropriation, \$14.00. Carried.

Peart—McInnis. That the Farmers' Institute have the use of the hall for a meeting on December 3rd. Carried.

Young—McInnis. That the Reeve and Dan Edge be appointed delegates to meet the hydro com. and engineers to look over plans of projected roads. Carried.

Peart—Young. That the statute labor charged against William Fallice be struck off collector's roll. Carried.

Young—McInnis. That Win. McLeod, sr, be relieved from paying dog tax, he having no dog. Carried.

Young—Peart. That commission on expenditures be paid as follows: Thos. Turnbull, \$10, Geo. Peart, \$3.50, Mr. McInnis, \$4.00. Carried.

Peart—McInnis. That Joseph Young be paid \$1.00 for trip to Dornoch on township business. Carried.

Peart—Young. That the clerk be paid \$20.00 on salary. Carried.

McInnis—Peart. That the Municipal World be paid 59 c. for account papers for treasurer and clerk's office. Carried.

Peart—McInnis. That Angus McArthur be paid \$6.50 for damage to plow working on roads. Carried.

The council adjourned to December 15th, at 10 a.m.

CHRISTMAS SEAL CAMPAIGN

8685 teachers throughout Ontario have had Christmas Seals placed in their hands. 761 banks will shortly receive the Seals. Some of the other organizations which are already at work are—Merchant Manufacturers, Lawyers, Real-Estate, and Insurance men.

Over four million Christmas Seals have already been prepared, and further issues are expected to follow.

The necessity of the Christmas Seal Campaign is clearly shown in the following statement, issued by the National Sanitorium Association;—Tuberculosis killed 2294 persons in Ontario alone in 1913—One every four hours.

Tuberculosis kills one-tenth to one-seventh of all our people. Tuberculosis kills one-third of all who die between the ages of 15 and 45.

THE TWEED "ADVOCATE" AND FORD CARS

The big pow-wow about Henry Ford's attitude towards the allies has practically faded into oblivion. The attempt to injure the Ford trade in Canada has resulted in a tremendous fizzle, a lot of free advertising, and another boost which will make the Ford even more popular. The fact is not generally known that Henry Ford of Detroit does not own, nor even hold a controlling interest in the Windsor Ford Company where the Canadian Ford is made. He owns 25 per cent of the shares, but the Company is managed by a Canadian and run by Canadians. They employ over three thousand hands and have sent four hundred men to the war, and are holding their positions open for them when they return. The Company pay their employees a minimum wage of four dollars a day, which in the aggregate constitutes a sum altogether too valuable to the country to be tampered with, specially at this time when the wheels of commerce should be kept running to capacity. The person responsible for a rumor that would affect the demand for employment such as afforded by the great Ford industry, or any industry, is on a par with the traitor and one on whom the country should keep a strict watch. The manager of the Canadian works is heart and soul with the allies and many of the shareholders in the company. Whatever words Mr. Ford did utter were from his personal point of view, and should not, he being an American citizen, effect a Canadian concern in which he is a stockholder only. That is sympathies are with the allies is very evident from the fact that since the war broke out he has been supporting 150 Belgian refugees in England, something in itself that proves conclusively that Henry Ford's heart is in the right place. Every knock proves a boost when it emanates from prejudiced sources and the Ford car has by the recent controversy
