CONSTANTINE OF GREECE DEFIES THE ALLIES

Repels Demands Made-Says Greece Will Protest to the World-Will Remain Neutral to the End

Constantine L, King of the Greeks, received the correspondent of the Associated Press at Athens and has given him a message for America on the attitude which Greece has assumed in the world war and the reasons were inadequate and that participation in the war by Greece would only result in Greek territory being laid waste by the enemy, King Constantine said: "If the Entente will assure me that when they are driven back into Greek territory they will consider the Balkan game ended, reembark, and leave Greece, I will guarantee with my whole army to protect their retreat against the Germans, Bulgarians, or anybody else and give them time to embark without being endangered. Then I would be legitimately protecting my frontiers, and it would not involve Greece in further risks. More I cannot do. Demand Too Great

"The Entente's demand is too much. They try to drive Greece out of neutrality; they come into Greek territory and waters as though they were theirs. At Nautila they destroyed tanks of petroleum intended to kill locusts on the excuse that they might stop Greek ships; they ruin Greek ways, and now they demand that we and erect a house worth \$300 to discuss reasonably any fair propos- under certain conditions als, but two things I will not concede: Greece shall not be forced or cajoled out of her neutrality; Greece will maintain her sovereignty and her sovereign rights to protect herself in

Bulgarians Wearying It is officially announced that only German, Austrian and Bulgarian officers have entered Monastir, no troops accompanying them, says a Reuter despatch from Athens. Athens says: "It is reported from Florina that the Bulgarian troops remain camped in the vicinity of Monastir at a place named St. Kiriaki. A delegation of the inhabitants went out to the Bulgarian outposts to notify the troops that they could enter the town. Bulgarian deserters arriving at Florina say that the great majority of the Bulgarian soldiers think that the war has been ended by the occupation of Macedonia, and do not want to continue fighting in the interests of the Germanic powers."

German Offensive Shattered

On the Russian front an attempted German offensive in the region of Dvinsk, near Schischkuo farm, northwest of Lake Sventen, broke down under rifle fire. Earlier reports state that the repulse on the left bank of the Styr southwest of Rafalovka was regained later. Serious losses were inflicted on the enemy above Czartorvsk, causing them to flee in dis-
