**Grape Jelly**  
Measure 7½ level cups (3¼ lbs.) sugar and 4 cups bottled Grape Juice into saucepan, stir and bring to a boil. Stir in 1 bottle (scant cup) Certo and bring again to a full boil for 1 minute. Remove from fire, let stand 1 minute, skim and pour quickly.

**Pineapple Jam**  
Use sliced or grated pineapple. If sliced pineapple is used, put slices through food chopper or chop fine. Mix the juice and chopped pineapple and measure 4 level cups into large pan. If necessary add water to fill 4th cup. Add 7½ level cups (3¼ lbs.) sugar, mix and bring to a vigorous boil, stirring constantly. Boil hard one minute.
