GETTING RID OF WEEDS

Results of Co-operative Experiments on Ontario Farms.

Over Eighty Farmers Have Experimented—Rape for Perennial Sow Thistle and Twitch Grass—Eradication of Bladder Campion and Cow-Bell.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

In 1911 experiments were begun with the object of gathering data from which definite statements might be made regarding the best methods of controlling the various bad weeds of the Province.

As a result of the data gathered from these experiments it is now possible to recommend with confidence definite methods for the eradication of such weeds as Perennial Sow Thistle, Twitch Grass, Bladder Campion and Wild Mustard.

The Rape Method for the Control of Perennial Sow Thistle and Twitch Grass.

Cultivate the field until about the middle of June, running over it frequently with a cultivator so as to keep the tops down and thus weaken the "roots."

Badly infested fields should be ploughed deeply in the fall and then cultivated and cross-cultivated with a broad-shared cultivator in order to break up and weaken the underground rootstocks.

Iron sulphate or Copperas can be successfully used to destroy mustard in standing grain without injury to the crop.

Apply on a calm clear day just as the first few plants in the fields show flowers. It is very important to spray early.

An ordinary hand pump barrel sprayer, such as is employed to spray fruit trees, may be used, or a potato sprayer can be rigged up to do this work.

The slug-sard will not plough by reason of the cold; therefore shall he beg in harvest and have nothing.

Here and There

Public works to be undertaken in Vancouver this year will cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000.

The Canadian Pacific steamship Montcalm carried 900 emigrants for Canada on her last voyage from Liverpool, the largest number of emigrants to leave that port this year.

Work was commenced last week on the new elevator at the Ballantyne pier, Vancouver, which will cost approximately \$2,000,000 to complete.

Three thousand seven hundred licensed grain elevators in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta have a total storage capacity of over 100,000,000 bushels.

The first lodge of Free and Accepted Masons in the history of the Merchant Marine World, was recently organized on the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of France.

Four thousand seven hundred and eighty-four cars of last season's fruit crop have been shipped out of the Okanagan district of British Columbia up to February 14th.

Sault Ste. Marie.—The new downtown ticket and telegraph office of the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Dominion Express Company at the corner of Queen and McDougall street.

A number of western interests have combined and chartered the Canadian Pacific steamship Pretorian, and the vessel will sail from Montreal on August 1st for Port Churchill.

J. S. Erown, president of the Brown Fruit Company of Edmonton, Alta., returned on the Metagama last week from a three months' visit to Europe.

When the Canadian Pacific steamship Metagama, which left St. John's on March first for Glasgow, reaches her destination, Captain G. B. Evans, O.B.E., her commander, will have completed his last voyage in command of the vessel.

Problems of the Farm

School Fairs.

Rural Credit Work.

During the past week two or three applications for the Long Term Loan have been received in the office of the Agricultural Representative, Markdale.

The Long Term Loan provides for the starting of young men on the farm or the paying off of a mortgage. In the former case 65 per cent. of the value of the farm is allowed.

Poultry Work.

Owing to the increasing importance in Poultry work and the universal carrying on of that industry, the Department at Markdale hopes to give a few feeding pointers as well as additional help in other lines in Poultry Husbandry.

1. Select the birds having a good length of rib, giving her the appearance of being deep from back to

point of breast. The back should be level.

2. Generally speaking the close-feathered birds are nearest egg-laying type. The loose-feathered bird is generally a poor layer.

3. The abdomen should not be over fat and sagging.

4. The head should be clean cut, medium size, not too long or crow-headed; not too short.

5. The bird should be wide across the back and carrying her width well out from the hips to the pelvic bone.

6. The keel or breast-bone should be straight in outline and run parallel with the back or sloping down. This gives the bird capacity for producing eggs.

7. To measure the capacity of a hen, place the little finger on the point of the keel bone and the first finger on the point of the pelvic bones.

8. The handling qualities are important. Absence of hard fat and a soft, pliable and elastic touch are desired.

The average person looking after hens may think no differences exist in individual birds. To such the Department request they catch a few hens in their own flocks and see for themselves.

As there are beef, dairy and dual types of cattle, so there are egg producers corresponding to the dairy cattle and meat fowls corresponding to the beef cattle.

It is to separate these two types of fowls that culling is necessary to get eggs in winter. Don't be content with reading this. Investigate for yourself.
