**PLANT LIFE, DIABETES CURE**

The Winnipeg Free Press published the following from its Edmonton correspondent on Monday afternoon:

"That a cure for diabetes lies latent in green onion tops, onion roots, barley roots, sprouted grain, green wheat, leaves, bean tops, lettuce and various forms of yeast has been demonstrated through a long series of experiments conducted by Dr. James B. Collip, head of the department of bio-chemistry at the University of Alberta and co-discoverer of the insulin treatment of diabetes with Dr. F. G. Banting, Dr. J. J. R. McLeod and C. H. Best at the University of Toronto more than a year ago. The new discovery, it is stated, will supplant insulin in the near future. It means the final victory over diabetes.

"In his experiments Dr. Collip has discovered in these forms of plant life a new hormone—that is the extract which has the effect of counteracting the condition known as diabetes. This hormone acts in a fashion somewhat similar to the now familiar insulin, although it is obtained from entirely different sources. Dr. Collip has given a name to this new substance, which promises to be even more useful than insulin. He calls it 'glucokinin'."
