### FISH CARS WRECKED

On Saturday afternoon about 6 o'clock the C. P. R. passenger train from Owen Sound jumped the rails this side of the "skew" crossing on West Broadway and caused a great excitement among the passengers and residents of the vicinity. The train consisted of the locomotive, two refrigerator cars, baggage, smoker and coach. Just at it rounded the curve the refrigerator cars left the rails and were followed by the rest of the train. The first two cars, which were loaded with fish, toppled over into the ditch and were so completely wrecked that they were burned by the wrecking crew. The baggage car was considerably damaged, but the passenger coach escaped fairly well. The engine did not leave the rails but the track was torn up for over one hundred yards. The heavy rails were bent and twist-

ed into all kinds of shapes. Fortunately none of the train crew or passengers were injured.
