

### Sir Henry Thornton Scholarship Girls



Some months ago Sir Henry Thornton, President of the Canadian National Railways, offered to the Federation of Young Farmers' Clubs in Great Britain, four scholarships. These scholarships comprised a tour of the Dominion of Canada and courses of instruction at various agricultural colleges in this country.

The winners were four English girl farmers, ranging in age from 14 to 18 years. They have arrived in Canada and are now on tour. They are accompanied by a chaperone, Miss Wolfe Murray, a journalist of distinction in England.

Their visit has excited much interest and they have been warmly welcomed in all places they have visited. In Ottawa they were the guests to a tea in Rideau Hall of His Excellency the Governor-General and Lady Byng, and they were also given an audience by the Prime Minister, the

Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King. In Quebec, where they disembarked, they were entertained by the Hon. J. E. Caron, Provincial Minister of Agriculture. At Montreal they were greeted by Sir Henry Thornton, donor of the scholarships. At Toronto, in the absence of Premier Drury, they were received at the Parliament Buildings by the Hon. R. H. Grant, Provincial Minister of Education. Side trips included visits to Macdonald College at St. Anne's, the Trappist Farm at Oka, the fruit belt of the Niagara Peninsula and Niagara Falls. The party, which is now in Western Canada, travelled across the Great Lakes to Porth Arthur by the Northern Navigation Company's route.

The youngest member of the party is Miss Joan Moore, who, although only 14 years of age, has raised calves which have won first prizes at the Loughboro' Calf Show, Leicestershire. Miss Moore comes from a

village about four miles from Loughboro'.

Miss Ivy Townsend, another member of the group, represents the Guildford Calf Club. She was the winner of the silver medal of the British Dairy Association for judging cows at the Dairy Cow Show in 1922.

Miss Mildred White, of the Devon Calf Club, is the third member of the scholarship team. She won first prize at the Hemyock Agricultural Show for team cow judging in 1921 and 1922.

The other scholarship girl is Miss Emma Absolon, who gained her honors for bee-keeping. She is the winner of the Apis Medal at the London Bee Club.
