HARDLY A DAY PASSES IN WHICH THE PRESS DOES NOT record some glaring violations of the Prohibition Amendment in the United States and at the present time all Washington is exercised over the publication of the names of prominent citizens guilty of wanton infraction of the law. No one can view the situation without genuine concern and grave fears for the future of a country where the law of the land is so consistently violated by those in high places. It was a timely warning with a widespread application that the Judicial Section of the American Bar Association issued at its annual meeting, in these words:

Reverence for law and enforcement of law depend mainly upon the ideals and customs of those who occupy the vantage ground of life in business and society.

The people of the United States, by solemn constitutional and statutory enactment, have undertaken to suppress the

age-long evil of the liquor traffic. When, for the gratification of their appetites, or the promotion of their interests, lawyers, bankers, great merchants and manufacturers, and social leaders, both men and women, disobey and scoff at this law, or any other law, they are aiding the cause of anarchy and promoting mob violence, robbery and homicide; they are sowing dragons' teeth, and they need not be surprised when they find that no judicial or

police authority can save our country or humanity from reaping the harvest. WITH ALL THESE NEW CULTS, THESE REPETITIONS OF formulas to cure bodily ailments, I often wonder what has become of God," says a writer in a brief but interesting article in the current issue of The Outlook. There is a growing tendency, the writer says, not so much to consciously reject God as to ignere Him, and to place the emphasis upon self. This tendency has been fostered by the development of new cults and isms of the day. Commenting on the vogue which Coueism is having at

the present time, the writer says: "There is much crying out these days for bodily refreshment; scarcely any at all for the old beautiful blessings that softly descend upon the heart if asked for fervently and with faith. One may read every paragraph in a recent book from the French wherein much voluntary advice is given as to how this and that ailment may be tramped into nothing, and fail to find one word which would cause the reader to seek a single contact with higher things. And the volume purports to be a revelation of that divine immanence within us all. It is obvious that only through some higher, unseen Power we are to find redemption from pain; yet that power is hurriedly, almost carelessly mentioned, and one is urged to a mere lip service, which, without God, means nothing at all.

"In our eagerness to get well in a moment we have lost sight of the most ancient goodness; forgotten that divine intervention is the only remedy for all ills, whether of the flesh or of the spirit; and until we go back to the old, tried paths I fear that our mumblings, sincere and well-intentioned though they may be, will not lead us very far on the ways of peace. There may be a brief period of self-hypnotism which will be mistaken for solid and abiding comfort; but the surest way to find God is to forget self; and I doubt the efficacy of a 'cure' based selfishly on the constant thought of one's own physical being."

INDIA PUTS ITS DISTINCTIVE MARK ON EVERYTHING that it touches. Though the religious value of music is valued the world over, the musical side of the mass movement toward Christianity in India is characteristically Indian. Reports from missionaries tell the story.

"In Meerut there have sprung up, along with the mass movement, real poet singers who have told the story of Jesus in song and ballad, just as the lives of India's great ones have been told through the centuries. The bagavather, or lyrical preacher, begins by singing in some Indian chant a song in praise of God. The subject is usually a Bible story told by means of songs describing various actions of the story. Interwoven are other songs and stanzas drawn from both Hindu and Christian literature, illustrating the main points of the story. Occasionally the address breaks off into a disquisition on some moral point which crops up. All is in song except the explanations, which are half chanted with musical accompaniment. The address is full of vivid illustration drawn from the life of the people. The preacher is ordinarily the composer of the songs used, and he generally adopts the nodding of the head and other gesticulations practised by the Indian singer. There has been a wonderful revival in singing in the Meerut District during the last year or two. Some of our own people have written new bhajans, or hymns, setting them to popular well-known village tunes and they have gone like wildfire over the entire district. Every place I go the people are singing in a wonderful new way. I have been astonished to hear boys about twelve years singing eight or ten of the bhajans perfectly to crowds of non-Christians. This will capture the hearts of the people of India as nothing else

THE PARIS "LE TEMPS" reported of Mussolini, the Italian premier, while attending the Lausanne conference, that he showed its correspondent a small book whose leaves he did not cease to turn over during the whole of the interview, even to the point of interrupting the conversation at times in order to read some passage. It was an illustrated copy of the New Testament in English, "and the Italian prime minister, now at ease and cordial, confided to me that it was the most beautiful book in the world."

SOME ONE ASKED AN OLD LADY HOW IT WAS SHE KEPT her youth so wonderfully. Her hair was snowy white, she was eighty years old, and her energy was waning; but she never impressed one with the idea of age, for her heart was still young in sympathy and intesest. And this was her answer:

"I learned how to forget disagreeable things. I tried to master the art of saying pleasant things. I did not expect too much of my friends. I kept my nerves well in hand and did not allow them to bore people. I tried to find any work that came

to hand congenial.' This is good advice, but it is of value only to those who are still young. Will they heed it?-The Christian.

Problems of the Farm

Grey County prultrymen are to be congratulated upon their progressiveness. Not alone are they to the front in entries, but their pens are holding leading positions. Others might well be encouraged to do likewise. The information regarding egg-laying contests can be secured free of charge.

Plant Aphis.

Many people have been troubled with what they call plant lice. These lare Aphis-a small-winged or wingcless red or green insect which sucks the juices of plants from the leaves or stems. They are always found upon the under side of the leaf.

As these insects only suck the sap from the leaves, poisons will not kill them, because a poison must be taken into the digestive system. The best thing to destroy them is Whale-oil Soap, or a substance called "Black Leaf 40." This is nicotine sulphate. The directions are on the can. These must be followed carefully.

If the Whaleoil Soap is used it requires one pound for every 6 gallons of water. Boil the soap and water. Be sure to throw the water under the leaves of the plants.

In the event of being unable to secure the Whaleoil Soap the ordinary washing suds "thrown through the leaves of the plant so the underside is covered will assist materially.

Grasshopper Poison.

The past few days has witnessed considerable increase in grasshoppers in various sections. The following is a first-class remedy: 11/2 lbs. White Arsenic (worth 17c.

1 handful Salt. 1 bran sackful Hardwood Sawdust. Dissolve the salt in about 3 gallons of water, add the molasses and pour over the sawdust in which has been mixed he arsenic.
