GORRIE WOOLLEN MILLS DESTROYED BY FIRE (Mildmay Gazette.) A disastrous fire took place at Gorrie last Saturday morning when the Hueston chopping mill and warehouse were completely destroyed. The chopper was operated by an oil engine and when the man in charge went to ignite the burner a slight explosion followed and in a few minutes the whole building was enveloped in flames. Besides handling grain and feed, Mr. Hueston keeps a large stock of imported lumber on hand, all of which was destroyed when the two buildings went up in smoke. Mr. Hueston's loss is estimated at \$20,000, with about \$3,000 insurance.

ARTHUR TOWNSHIP MAN KILLED WHEN THROWN AGAINST TREE (Grand Valley Star.) A very sad and fatal accident occurred in Arthur Township about 4 o'clock last Wednesday afternoon, when Norman Randall, son of Mr. J. Randall, was thrown from a runaway wagon against a tree and sustained such internal injuries that he died within an hour and a half. The young man had been drawing wood for a Mr. Clements and was emptying the wagon when the horses took fright and ran about ten rods, colliding with a tree. Medical help could do nothing for the injured man his back being affected.

Miss Macphail in Parliament. ("The Mace" in Saturday Night.)

And what of the lone lady member? Miss Agnes Macphail for the greater part of the session was like the legendary good little girl, content to be seen but not heard. Seldom did she throw aside the kimono (I think that is the proper term in the circumstances) of coy and demure reserve in which she was swathed. Frequently she trembled on the brink of an enticing debate, but seldom did she venture in the uncertain waters. It is passing strange therefore that in the last days when everybody was whistling "Home Sweet Home" and chinking their indemnity doubloons in their jeans (not Miss Macphail of course) she should have emerged from her cocoon long enough to get a curt reprimand. Be it known that Miss Macphail is one of those persons who believe that the old line parties are mere slaves and serfs of the mysterious "privileged interests" and "big business", those ghastly twins which fit on and off the parliamentary stage. During the sessions of the Banking and Commerce committee Miss Macphail made several caustic references to these imaginary influences. Emboldened therefore she spoke in the House about members voting at the behest of privileged interests and so on. She was obliged to withdraw and before she did so a neat little lecture was read to her from the Government benches on the

advisability of looking before leaping. Mr. Forke gallantly came to her rescue and opined that Miss Macphail was sincere, which nobody had questioned. Finally she begged everybody's pardon and the breeze subsided. Perhaps the member for South East Grey would have benefited more had the correction been administered at an earlier stage of her parliamentary career. The risk has been run of spoiling the child by sparing the rod.

Be It Known.

(Kincardine Review.) The telegraphic intrusion of Rev. Ben. Spence into the recent election campaign through the medium of churches should not be allowed to pass without further comment. On Sunday—the eve of election day—his telegram was read. It had no purpose but that of using the result of the Manitoba referendum to demagogue the Conservative party in Ontario. In the course of a year there will probably be a similar referendum in Ontario and Rev. Ben Spence and his associates will be busier still. They will expect to use the pulpit as a forum and the church as a committee room. They should be told in good time that there are some men who will not tolerate their propaganda in churches any further. We do not wish or expect our views on the Ontario Temperance Act to be preached from the pulpit and we do not propose to allow the paid advocates of extreme coercion to go back into the pulpits they deserted and use them to advance their own interests as well as their own principles.
