"JOHN J." ESCHEWS POLITICS IN ADDRESS TO FARMERS

Explains Objections to "Broadening Out," But Does Not Mention Mr. Drury.

J. J. Morrison, Secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario, addressed a large gathering at Camilla, in the vicinity of Orangeville, last week. The meeting had been termed a "U. F. O. Revival," and Mr. Morrison spoke for an hour and a half. During the entire 90 minutes the U. F. O. Secretary did not once breathe the name of ex-Premier Drury, nor did he even refer to the recent Provincial elections.

He made no reference to party politics nor to the Ferguson administration at Toronto, his entire address being an exposition on the constitution of the U.F.O. Mr. Morrison explained his objections to the "broadening-out" policy by saying that this was not included in the constitution of the U.F.O. and therefore had no place in its program. Because of this he considered it his duty to oppose it. According to Mr. Morrison the far-

mers should expect nothing from the manufacturers or big interests in the way of assistance. He said that the tillers of the soil would have to work out their own salvation, and to do this they should co-operate and endeavor to get a better understanding among themselves.
