

Baptists As A World Power

To any one who recalls what were the splendors of ceremonial religion, Roman Catholic and Protestant, which once adorned with a divine sanction the banished thrones of the Old World, it is indeed strange to be told that Warren Gamaliel Harding, Charles Evans Hughes, and David Lloyd-George, should belong, all of them, with John D. Rockefeller, to a "sect" once so despised, so persecuted and so poor as the Baptists.

It means that over the palaces of emperors, the castles of the nobility, the mansions of the merchant, the fortresses of the militarist, the colleges of the erudite, and the cathedrals of the ecclesiastics, those humble folk, who were immersed in the chilly yet soul-cleansing waters of the River Jordan, who prayed the more zealously in their chapels because they were excluded from parliament and the universities, who were too Puritan even for the Puritans, have at last established their civic claim.

Such an achievement of prosperity, commercial, political, social, is unparalleled.

President Harding is dead, David Lloyd George is no longer Premier of Great Britain, J. D. Rockefeller has been supplanted as the richest man in the world by Henry Ford. ATTENTIONS COST MONEY

Aged Alliston Swain Pays Dearly For Alienation of Affections of Townsman's Wife.

Robert Stephenson of Alliston paid attention to the wife of Hiram W. Childs, and by a process in court at Barrie he has learned that it is a costly experience. He was sued for alienation of the wife's affections, the damages being figured by Childs at \$10,000, but the verdict is for \$1,000, just one-tenth of the sum named.

Both the parties live at Alliston. Child's wife is a war widow whom Childs married two years ago. Evidence went to show that Stephenson, who is 72 years of age, became attentive to Mrs. Childs shortly after her marriage, and a number of endearing letters written by Stephenson to Mrs. Childs were found by Mr. Childs and produced in court.

Evidence of husband and wife was at variance at many points, the woman's testimony favoring the defendant rather than her husband. All three parties, particularly the elderly defendant, came in for some very stinging criticism from Mr. Justice Mowat in his address to the jury.

Noted artists, famous moving picture directors and expert scenic photographers, like thousands of tourists, have succumbed to the lure of the innumerable beauties of Banff and the Canadian Pacific Rockies. Artists in increasing numbers each year spend the summer on the trail in the mountains transferring these beauties to canvas.

Belmore Browne, artist, author, explorer and conqueror of Mt. McKinley, 20,300 feet, lives in his own bungalow-studio in Banff the year round except when exhibiting in New York. He and Rungius both study the mountain goats, sheep, deer and bear in their wilderness homes and paint them and their majestic scenic backgrounds.

She is survived by her husband and five daughters, Mrs. T. L. Mercer of Markdale, Mrs. J. M. Mercer of Vancouver, Mrs. D. D. Suits of Little Falls, N.Y., Mrs. Thompson Plewes of Sudbury, Mrs. William New of Iton, N.Y., and also one son, Mr. Jack Flesher of Vancouver. She also leaves two sisters, Mrs. H. MR. JUSTICE WRIGHT WILL TRY TWO MURDERERS

Newly-appointed Justice Will Have Charge of Fall Assizes at London, Ontario.

On the 15th of this month, Sydney Murrell will be arraigned at the assizes at London before Mr. Justice Wright, charged with the murder of Russell Campbell at Melbourne in April of 1921 and John Williams, also known as "Slim," who was with Murrell when the killing took place, is to be brought back from Kingston to stand trial also. It is stated that J. M. Donahue, who is acting for Murrell, will also defend Williams, who has been serving a term in Kingston for banditry. Authorities of Middlesex County jail are making extraordinary preparations to frustrate any attempt at the rescue of Murrell by his friends. When the trial opens, the prisoner will be brought to the courtroom by an un-

derground passage instead of through a corridor as has been the custom for years.

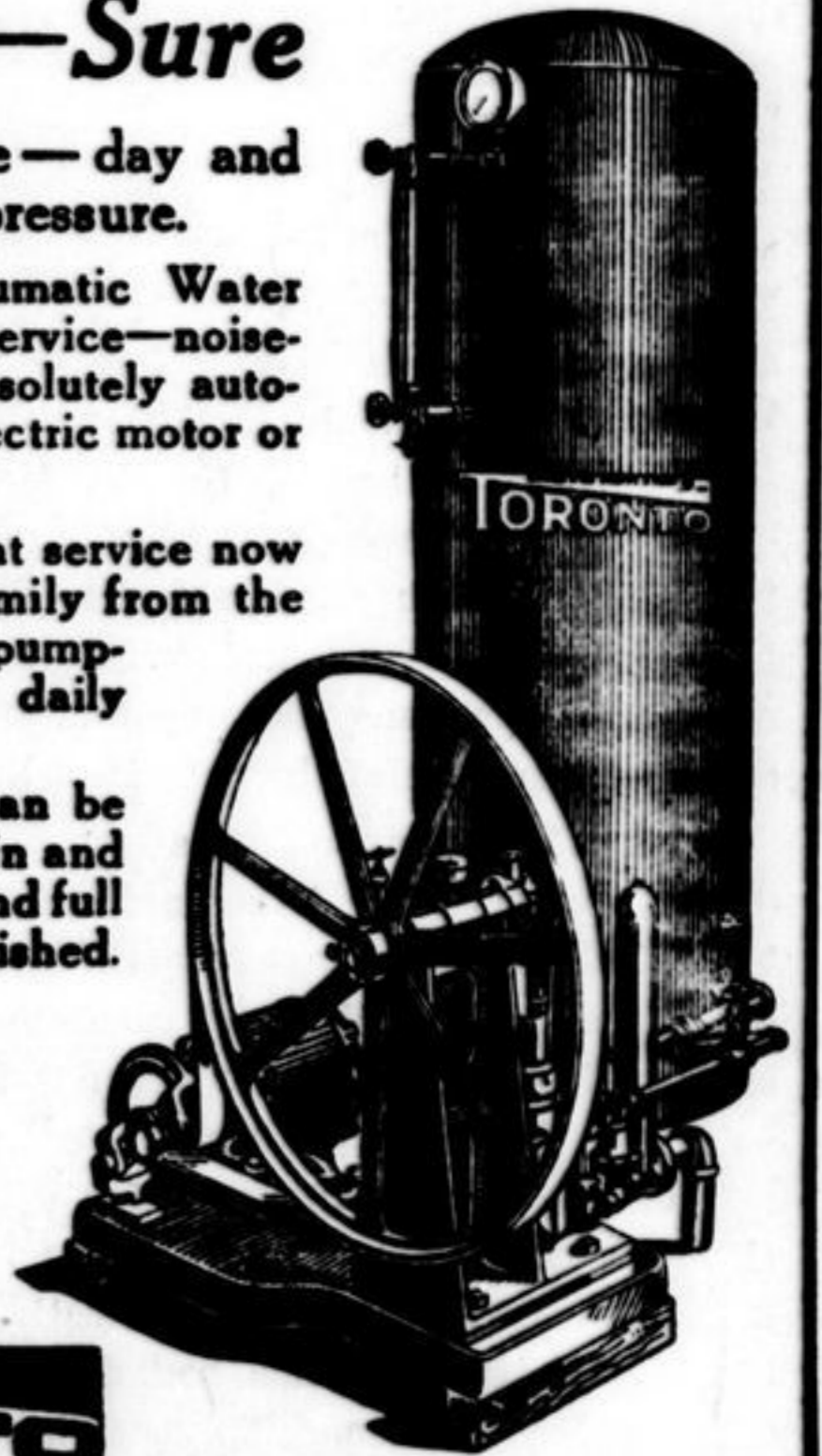

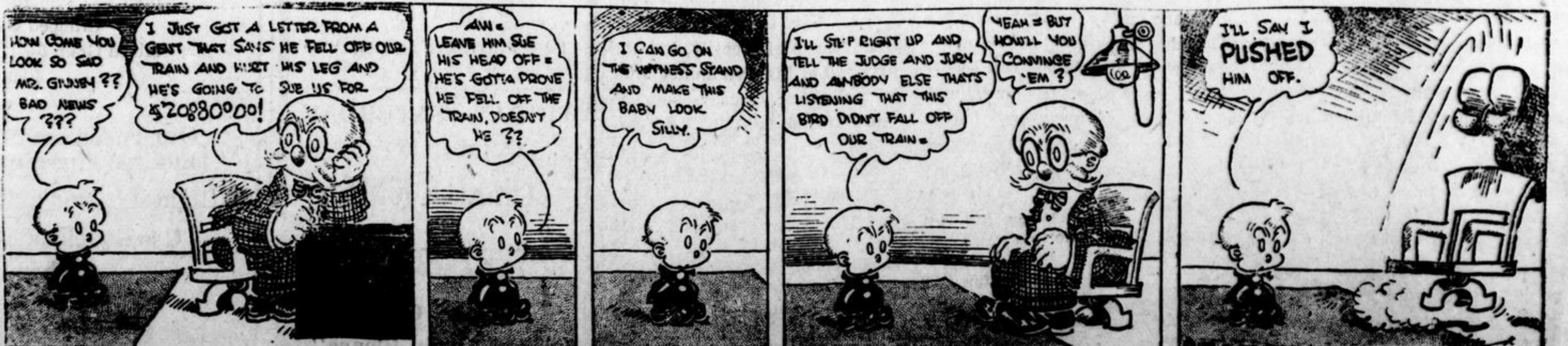
