Has Desirable, Cheap Grain and How to Get a Fair Profit Out of Swine. Canada is rapidly succeeding the

Swine are profitable when given abundant sunshine and exercise, fed on well selected feeds, gently handled, given proper sanitation and housing, kept free from worms and lice, and protected against cholera and other diseases. Much can happen a pig between birth and old age, but it is an easy animal to keep in the straight and narrow path leading to successful and profitable development if you go the right way about it.

Pigs frequently suffer more from the heat of the sun during the summer than they do from the cold of the winter period. If possible, make full use of any available shade trees when making your plans for swine pastures, feed lots or colony house | ger. locations.

#### The Self-feeder for Pigs.

Young pigs having access to a self-feeder may neglect the pasture portion of their rations, so must be watched from time to time. The selffeeder can be used with mature breeding stock, providing the ration given is bulky and contains such with Mr. George Harvey of Brant. roughage as ground alfalfa. Mature breeding stock are apt to become too fat if given the freedom of helping themselves. The self-feeder is intended as an aid to feeding operations during the grazing season, and as such, it will reduce the labor requirement of feeding over fifty per cent.
