body of the motor vehicle. This prescribed speed limit. does not apply to motor trucks. For a violation of this regulation a penalty of not less than \$5 and not more than \$10 is provided for a first offence; for a second offence, a penalty of not less than \$10 and not more than \$25; and for any subsequent offence a penalty of not less than \$25 nor more than \$50 is provided. In adidtion, a motorist may have his license suspended for period not exceeding sixty days.

The new law has also made some changes regarding the lamps to be carried and a new provision as to parking lamps has been enacted.
