STATLER ENFRANCHISED THE HUMBLE GUEST

When Ellsworth M. Statler was a youth he saved a dollar and went to a phrenologist, trusting that he might receive direction as to the career he might adopt. The professor thumbed his bumps and told the lad that he might, if he preserved his health and studied, become a satisfactory farm hand. All other avenues he was to consider as closed. But Statler doubted and before he died the other day, had become the best known hotel man in the world. About twenty years ago his name became familiar to Canadians, and particularly to people from Toronto and Hamilton, who frequently visited Buffalo. For years they had been accustomed to go to the Tift House, which was either operated by a Canadian, or provided some other sound reason for being regarded as Canadian headquarters in Buffalo. Then came the Statler Hotel, a new kind of hotel, neither gaudy nor pretentious, with a bath in each room, and later a morning newspaper delivered to each guest, with the compliments of the proprietor. Not long ago Statler had a radio set in every guest room in the half dozen hotels he owned or operated. He said that the radio, he believed, would make the time pass more pleasantly for the guest.

He Discovered Service

If it could be shown, and we believe it could, that Statler was the first man in commercial life to talk about Service, there would be millions to call down a murrain upon his departed head. The modern world has become so pelted with the word that its effect is revolting or nauseating. But with Statler it was a reality. He had a new idea, and it became the secret of his success. When Statler said Service, the hearer did not give the appropriate reply of applause. When Statler said Service he proved it, he gave something that nobody else happened to be giving in just the same way. It is true that his rivals tumbled over each other's heels to provide something just as good or a little better, and it is true that the modern commercial world seems to be a welter of service, with nobody left willing to admit that he is in business to make money. In a word, the Statler idea has become vulgarized. But it was not vulgarized by Statler. It was he who adopted the principle that the guest is always right and it proved successful. Of course, the guest was not admitted to be right if he wanted to walk out with the silverware, or if, unknown and unidentified, he desired to cash a large cheque.

Struck Shackles From Guest

Before the coming of Statler the prevailing idea in hotel management was that the average hotel clerk with his diamond sunburst in his shirt front, who received a guest's humble request for a room with the same air as a duchess listening to the confession of some unchurched chamber maid provided sustenance for hundreds of humorists a generation ago. When Statler started his Buffalo hotel he laid down a list of instructions to his staff, which was publicly displayed and which a guest could quote in the course of any argument that might arise. He began by saying "Our hotels are operated primarily for the benefit and convenience of their guests. Without guests there could be no hotels." This was revolutionary, for the established idea was that hotels were operated primarily for the benefit of their owners, and that without hotels there could be no guests. It was assumed therefore that the guests should be mighty grateful for the hotels. Another reminder was "Never be perky, pungent or fresh—the guest pays your salary, as well as mine. He is your immediate benefactor. Snap judgments of men sometimes are faulty. A man may wear a red

SOME CAUSES OF SOFT PORK

Just what factors are responsible for the large number of soft hogs which sometimes arrive at the abattoirs are not easy to determine, and, unless the origin of these hogs is traced back through the various trade channels to their source, the contributing causes cannot be established definitely. Lacking facilities to investigate the problem from that angle, the alternative is to establish feeding conditions, which from experience have demonstrated that they may be faulty, and by checking up on the carcasses, determine if these are the actual faults.

It has been observed that many Western hogs produce soft sides, and as it is a common practice to use rather restricted ration, consisting, in many instances, of single grains, this information was used as

Bombshell in Hotel World

"The Unpretentious Man", pursued Mr. Statler, "with the soft voice may possess the wealth of Croesus. The stranger in cowhide boots, broad brim and rusty black hair may be president of a railroad or a senator from over the ridge." This, of course, was not news to the world at large, but it burst like a bombshell upon the hotel clerks and managers of that era. Then Statler proceeded to shatter them still further by proceeding to point out that occasionally a perverse member of his staff might argue with his guest as to whether sauce was ordered, whether the trunk had been sent up or whether a room had been reserved. He concluded in these devastating words "Either may be right. But these are permanent instructions. No employee of this hotel is allowed the privilege of arguing any point with the guest. He must adjust the matter at once to the guest's satisfaction, or call his superior to adjust it. Wrangling has no place in this hotel." One reason why this new doctrine prevailed was that for generations previously hotel guests had been so cowed by the unaccustomed magnificence of their surroundings and the stern disciplining of martinet clerks that the spirit of revolt had been crushed. They won no more arguments in the Statler than in the Tift, because they started none.

Working at Nine

The late Mr. Statler went to work when he was nine years old. He worked in a store, in a glass factory, and then became a bellboy in a hotel. Later he ran a restaurant and a billiard room, his various occupations taking him to half a dozen states. He got his first real stake in the Statler restaurant in Buffalo which preceded the hotel by several years, and his first success in operating a hotel came in the Pan-American Exposition in that city. He also was the lessee of the famous "Inside Inn" at the St. Louis Exposition in 1904. At the time of his death he owned or operated hotels in Buffalo, St. Louis, Cleveland, Detroit, Boston and New York. His New York hotel was the famous Hotel Pennsylvania, in which he died.

the basis upon which to conduct the investigation. It must not be assumed from the above statement that poor judgment in the selection and use of feeds is limited to the West, as such is not the case.

Tests recently conducted at the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa with such single feeds as ground oats, ground barley and middlings, and compared with mixed meal rations, indicated that single feeds as a class are more conducive to softness than well selected mixed meal rations. Also, it was found that the addition of buttermilk to these feeds decreased the percentage of soft sides.

Previous tests at this Farm indicated that corn or beans, when comprising all or a major part of the ration, had a tendency to produce softness, while on the other hand, the use of good grain mixtures, and the supplementing of the ration with milk or succulence in some form, counteracted in a marked degree any tendency towards softness.

There also appears to be an intimate relationship between the stage of maturity or the physical condition of the hog and the firmness of fleshing. Hogs which are unfinished or not carrying sufficient fat are frequently soft when slaughtered.

Evidence also points to the fact that unthrifty or poor doing hogs are fruitful sources of soft sides.

Elton Armstrong, a noted junior farmer judge of York County, has some very convincing figures to prove that sheep pay.
