Ontario Cattle Export Control Plan Favored

Marketing Board Holds Final Approval Until West Heard From .- Two New Features.

Ontario producers' plan to regulate the marketing for export of beef and dairy cattle from the province to Great Britain and other European countries met a favorable reception before the Dominion Marketing Board last week The official decision, though, is not expected for several weeks when livestock will have advanced.

The proposal contemplates regulation of the export of both quantity and quality of Ontario's cattle under a local board of 16 members to be known as the Ontario Cattle Export Marketing Board Its headquarters would be in Toronto.

Two additional feature proposals are contained in the plan: (a) Establishment of a shipping organization in Montreal, and (b) appointment of a commercial representative overseas.

Ensured facilities for the shipment of Ontario cattle to European markets at all seasons of the year to guard against the "near monopoly" of space on cattle boats at the instance of several firms; better quality and eventually increased livestock exports; reduced selling and shipping costs; creation of a competitive market in Europe and the anticipation of better returns for the Ontario producer were the arguments advanced in favor of the scheme by its sponsors

The proposed constitution of the local board to be set up in Toronto, Ontaria officials told Chairman G. H. S. Barton and his colleagues, would consist of three nominees of the federation of Holstein-Freisian Clubs of the province. a similar number appointed by the federation of Ayrshire Clubs of Ontario and 10 to be named by the federation of County Beef Cattle Feeders' Associations, known as the Ontario Beef Cattle Feeders Association, one of whom shall represent each of the following counties: Bruce, Elgin, Grey, Huron, Kent, Lambton, Middlesex, Perth, Waterloo and Wellington.


A difference exists between the Otrtario livestock plan and that of Alberts and Saskatchewan with which Manitoba is expected to join. Ontario's scheme is to regulate the marketing for export while the plan of the prairie provinces is to regulate the marketing of their cattle in both the domestic and export markets.
