In many cases, German prisoners have told Allied officials that companies have been cut down to 49 men from their usual 160. This would indicate a serious situation for the Nazis that will undoubtedly get worse unless they pull in trained reserve from other fronts.

Apparently the Nazis realize their German High Command issued a threat to abandon international rules of warfare as a result of what it charged was "increasing infringement of international law by our enemies." Another indication of Nazi uneasiness Sufferers of was Propaganda Minister Goebbles' bleeding and order that German people cease all protuding public discussion of the war situation.


