INDUCTION OF REV. J. LITTLE.

The induction of the Rev. John Little into the pastorate of the Presbyterian church of this place took place in the church yesterday afternoon, Rev. Mr. Smith of Daywood, Moderator of the Presbytery presiding. Rev. Mr. Hunter of Markdale preached the sermon, taking for his text verse 29, chap. V of II Corinthians, "Now then we are ambassadors of Christ, as though God did beseech you by us; we pray you in Christ's stead, be ye reconciled to God. He explained that an ambassador at a foreign court was the representative of his sovereign, with no interests other than his sovereign's, and showed that in like manner a minister of the gospel was the ambassador of God. After the sermon, prayer and song praise the new pastor was invited to the front, answering the usual questions and formally inducted into the charge. Rev. Dr. Somerville of Owen Sound then addressed the congregation. The following clergymen were present during the induction ceremony and warmly congratulated their brother on receiving his new charge. Rev. Dr. Somerville of Owen Sound, McNab of Kilsyth, Hunter of Markdale, Burnett of Keady, McLaren of Rocklyn, Smith of Daywood, Davidson, Yeomans, Reilly and Scott.

The induction ceremony being over Rev. Dr. Somerville and Mr. Mitchell conducted Mr. Little to the basement where he and Mrs. Little were introduced to and received the warm congratulations of the members of the congregation and a large number of friends from other congregations, after which all enjoyed a social time discussing the excellent tea generously provided for all by the ladies of the congregation.—Chatsworth News.

Members of the Horticultural Society, having suffered from its existence and while not wishing to be officious by those whose attention was directed to the pest, and not desiring to invoke the law—penalty \$20 fine, and costs, have appointed an Inspector.

Will every person having plum trees or cherry trees please examine them closely removing and burning all Black Knot found. The leaves having fallen, the work can be easily done and now is the time. It is during the rains of winter and spring that the spores are liberated, and wait hither and thither by the wind till falling on plum or cherry trees they grow.
