stand six feet in height all over the
field, barley yields well, but the dews

1500 bushels of turnips to the acre.

We have no peewaals so far, but
peas must be sown early, and the
sample is grand.

We have rhubarb stocks 4 feet long
and 8 inches round with a leaf wider
than an ordinary door, but not as
long.

All ordinary vegetables come to
perfection but corn, sugar cane, peanuts
and the like are not a success. We grow them but our summer nights
are too cool and delightful to furnish
sufficient heat for these and other
similar products. Apples and crab
apples are now shown every year at
our fairs, but we are having the same
trouble with these trees that all new
settlers in wooded countries have.

IN ALGOMA.

We are indebted to Mr. John Ritchie
Principal of Port Arthur Public Schools
or a copy of the Weekly Herald pub-
lished in that town. It contains the
Annual report of the Managers of the
"Illustration Farm," in which may be
found surprising evidence of the agri-
cultural possibilities of the region. Also two able editorials on the resour-
ces of Western Ontario, with an article
on the great possibilities of traffic
likely to be encouraged by the opening
of the Thunder Bay, Nipissing and
Algoma Railway. No mistake the
country has a future before it. Here is
an extract from the Managers' Report:

"For successful farming here we must
have fall ploughing, good drainage
and early sowing. With these there
is no doubt as to the results. This
district is specially suited for wheat,
oats, barley, peas, hay and root crops,
and when we get more of our black
bottom lands cleared up we will be
able to grow flax successfully.

One Alexander McKenzie of Oliver
grew 45 bushels of spring wheat to
the acre, on his last year's potato
ground. One holy Martyr of Oliver
Township took the first prize in our
\$100 potato competition, by growing
over 50 bushels on the sixteenth of an
acre. The Algoma potatoes are simply
matchless for quality. We have no
potato bug and the average yield of
the district is about 180 bushels.
