OUR OTTAWA LETTER.

The formal opening of the new Conservative head quarters in this city on Thursday night was made the occasion of a characteristic address by the Hon. Geo. E. Foster. There was nothing new in his remarks, which followed closely upon the lines of all his speeches since the House adjourned. He declared the Liberal party and failed to keep ante election promises, but in this connection omitted to call attention to the repeal of the Franchise Act, the radical remodelling of the civil service superannuation scheme, the taking of the plebiscite, the tariff reductions, the rushing of the work on the St. Lawrence Canal, the reorganization of several departments which are now run at a profit instead of at a loss, and a dozen other pre election undertakings which have been faithfully carried out during the brief two years that the Government have been in power. He declared that the two things upon which the next election would be decided (decided of course in a manner, favorable to the Opposition) were "the honest square policy of the Conservatives and the disregard of principle shown by the Liberal party since its advent to power."

Two Policies Compared.

Of the latter enough has been said above; as to "the honest square policy" Mr. Foster gave no particulars, possibly he was thinking of the Langevin Block and Curran Bridge steals, the Section B and Caron scandals, the Sheik's Island Dam, the Galops Channel and Little Rapids Lock jobs, and a score of other boodling scandals which were unearthed and admittedly proved, absolutely, not by irresponsible newspaper investigation but by the sworn testimony of unwilling witnesses before Conservative committees of Parliament. Mr. Foster evidently imagines that Canadian electors have mighty short memories. Moreover, in spite of unusual and unexpected expenditures the prosecution of costly permanent public works of inestimable value in the development of the country as for example the deepening of the St. Lawrence Canals and the entirely new item of Yukon administration; in spite of these, at the end of two years his successor is able to show a surplus of over a million and a half dollars against the annually recurring deficits which in four years totalled over six millions. The Finance Department seems to have changed for the better, at least, as far as practical results show, and the Opposition has yet to appear who can point to any other Department where the same statement is not equally true.

The Way the West is Mowing.

While a great deal has been said and written respecting the work of the Immigration Department it is doubtful if citizens generally appreciate the tremendous progress that has been made this year in the work of opening up and settling the North West. Never has there been so much land taken up and returns of both homestead entries and railway land sales demonstrate this to a remarkable degree. During the twelve months ending Sept. 30th, for instance, the homestead entries granted totalled 4,337 as against 2,213 for the previous twelve months, or an increase of nearly 100 per cent, though the figures of the year ending September 30th, 1897 were 30 per cent. in advance of the previous year. The statement of the C. P. R. land sales for the first nine months of this year are just as indicative of the rapid strides with which the country is opening up. In 1896 the Company disposed of 48,234 acres of its land during the first nine months of that year, the price obtained being \$168,406 and in the first three-quarters of 1897, 114,496 acres were sold for the total of \$383,281, but this year up to Sept. 30th, no less an area than 288,335 acres has been disposed of for the total of \$930,974.

Nothing The Matter With These.

The increase here is even greater than in the homestead entries quoted above. It is all very well as a matter of election pyrotechnics to declaim against Galicians, Doukhoborts, Menonites and other classes of immigrants, but while it can be shown that the new-comers, whatever their nationality, are thrifty, intelligent, and law abiding, some prepared to earn their own homesteads by compliance with the none too easy regulations, and others to pay for their land in hard cash to the tune of nearly one million dollars, the country will be satisfied to let the practical evidences of their suitability as fellow citizens outweigh the unsubstantial vaporings of irresponsible stumpers.

Development In The Yukon.

Already indications are appearing that the time of Parliament will be much occupied next Session with the consideration of numerous enterprises looking towards the further opening up and developing of the gold fields. Almost every number of the Gazette constructs, and operate a line of railway from the Stikine River to Teslin Lake and on to Dawson City and also from the Stikine south to some point on the coast capable of being made an ocean port, also from the Lynn Canal, by way of Fort Selkirk to Dawson, together with branch lines in the Yukon district, and in connection with the said railway to put up telegraph and telephone lines as may be necessary. This is only one of the many that will be on the order paper when the Session starts.

Stamping Out The Disease.

A whole week has past without a return of any bad symptoms of what the Globe has aptly termed "Siftonia." The drastic treatment of the disease by the Premier, when by his unqualified denial of the resignation stories, that had become as monotonous as they were ridiculous, appears to have killed out the last germs. The Port Arthur Herald appropriately closes up the discussion in that section, by remarking "Premier Laurier says that Sifton is too valuable a man to be made Governor of Manitoba and to this we say, 'amen.'" Western Canada has no better friend in the cabinet and no one is in a position to know its wants and needs as well. Hon. Sifton is a hustler. He is a full working cousin of Tarté and the two make a spanking general purpose team. We wish Canada had a hundred thousand of just such men."

Just One Little Spasm.

By the way there was one little spasm the other day in the Mail-Empire, where a paragraph appeared to the effect that the Minister of the Interior, having pretty well provided for all his relatives, had now arranged for the entry of his brother into the North West Assembly. Of course the fact, in this instance. Mr. A. T. Sifton contested the seat held by the leader of the Opposition, a gentleman who had sat in the House from the beginning and was regarded as one of its fixtures. All this counts for nothing with the dear old Mail. At any rate the electors seemed to be well pleased with the opportunity afforded them to return a relative of the Minister of the Interior (seeing the Opposition insist upon putting it that way) though as a matter of fact any unbiased observer knows that the candidate was elected on his own merits and not on his family connection.
