**MAGISTRATE'S COURT.**

Before Wm. Calder and H. W. Mocker J. P.'s in Town Hall, on Monday, was tried the case of James Lediard, Agent of the Children's Aid Society, O. Sound, v. s. Ada Maud Hill, and Olive Lindle.

As we intimated last week, these children were arrested and brought to Durham by the above named Agent: the result of this trial justifies the action. The evidence will explain itself.

Samuel McGowan sworn, I am an uncle to the mother of the children mentioned, viz., Ada Maud Hill and Olive Lindle. I am well acquainted with the mother of the said children and know that these children are hers. She told me that she was not getting enough support for the children from Mr. Queen who had been guardian of the children, I know that Queen has been discharged from guardianship over a year ago and that the money has been stopped since that time. Mrs. Lindle came to me a year ago last June and told me she was not getting sufficient then to support her and the children. From my knowledge of Mrs. Lindle's surroundings she has nothing to support either herself or children at the present time.

John Calvert sworn. I am acquainted with Mrs. Lindle and know both she and the children viz., Ada Maud Hill and Olive Lindle. I was an Executor for some property in which Mrs. Lindle was concerned. I am certain that Mrs. Lindle has not any means of support for herself or the children named. Mrs. Lindle is not a capable person to have the children under her care, and if she had the means would not care properly for the children. She has come to my house and asked for assistance for herself and children.

Alexander Dodds sworn. I am a miller near Orchardville and Mr. Queen has been buying flour from me for Mrs. Lindle. He bought the last bag about two weeks ago for her. He says he is the guardian of the children of the said Mrs. Lindle. He has bought two bags of flour during the last month. Any flour which has been paid for to Mrs. Lindle has not been paid for nearly a year.

Mrs. Cathrine Hoeflin sworn. Mrs. Lindle has been in the habit of coming to my house and getting assistance in the way of milk, bread, potatoes, meat, butter and clothes. She stated to me that she had nothing to live on. Some times she brought the children and their appearance indicated that they needed clothes very badly. From my knowledge of the case and statements made by Mrs. Lindle, I am satisfied that she is unable to support the children.

Samuel Neal sworn. I have seen Mrs. Lindle crying on the road for what I believe to be want of support. Have seen the children, they looked neglected and filthy.

James Lediard sworn. I am agent for the Children's Aid Society, of the County of Grey. I received information from the Superintendent of Aid Societies requesting me to look into the conditions of Ada Maud Hill and Olive Lindle. I visited the house of Mrs. Lindle on Wednesday last and found the said Mrs. Lindle and the children Ada Maud Hill and Olive Lindle in a wretched condition in rags and filth. The children were hungry, had nothing for breakfast and there was no food in the house. There was a very little fire and no wood except a handful of wet bark. Mrs. Lindle said she had nothing and had received nothing only a little bread the previous Saturday. She said she had no means of support unless what came from Queen and that Queen made improper relationships with her for what she got. That he had connection with her since the hearing in Ayton. Finding this condition of affairs I had the children arrested and removed, and would now ask that they be committed to the care of the Children's Aid Society of Owen Sound.

James Carsen sworn. I have heard the evidence of Jas. Lediard just given and can corroborate it in every particular as I was present with him and arrested the children.

John Collins sworn. I am half brother of Mrs. Lindle mother of the children Ada Maud Hill and Olive Lindle. She has not any means of support for herself or children to my knowledge. She has been begging at my place several times. I am satisfied that Mrs. Lindle is not a proper person to have the care of these children and has not the means of support. I know that collections have been taken up to supply Mrs. Lindle and the children to keep them from starving.

John Queen sworn. I have provided Mrs. Lindle with sufficient support for Ada Maud Hill and Olive Lindle by giving her flour money and clothing necessary for her and the children's support. I have given Mrs. Lindle 100 lbs of flour about every 20 or 25 days during the last year. I have given her about 20 pounds of oatmeal per month. I have given her two three pound boxes of biscuits per month during the last year. I have given her about 1 1/2 lbs of tea per month. I have given her about 5 lbs of sugar per month. I have given her money for meat say about 25 or 30cts. I have given her bread. I was appointed guardian for Ada Maud Hill about 5 years ago. I am still guardian. I got \$50 during the last summer. The last yearly payment of \$150 was made to me about March 1897. I got \$150 in March 1897. I got nothing during 1897 or 98 with the exception of \$50 during 1898. I was notified about a month ago that no further order could be granted by Hoskins. I expect to be in a position to pay the money myself for the support of the children.

By Mr. Lediard. I am certain that I have not been notified by the Official Guardian of my removal of Guardianship. I sent her a few pounds of flour the day before the children were arrested.

The Magistrates after hearing the evidence decided to commit the children Ada Maud Hill and Olive Lindle to the care of the Children's Aid Society of Owen Sound and that a rate of \$1.50 per week for each of the children be granted to the said Society so long as the said children are under the care of the said Society to be paid by the County of Grey.
