Hon. Clifford Sitton is at Manitoba last week and this, and is the recipient of numerous banquets and other testimony as to his worth as a public man.

Efforts are being made to get the Prince of Wales to come to Canada next year to open the new Victoria Bridge at Montreal. He opened its predecessor in 1860.
