In the course of one of its periodical squibs against the Government's immigration policy, the Mail-Empire observes 'It is remarkable that the Government does not try to get out some British settlers. If the retired statesman who are acting as emigration agents over the water would do something, we might divert to Canada at least a portion of the stream of emigration now making for Australia.' The best answer to this may be found in the last Imperial emigration returns which bring the figures up to the end of November. These figures show that during the first eleven months of the year, there were 3,000 more emigrants left British ports for Canada than for the Cape, and 6,000 more than left for Australia; the totals being English 14.861, Scotch 1,687, Irish 853, or a total of 17,400. Thousands of Anglo Saxons have also moved into the Canadian North West from the United States, and when the returns for the year are completed, it will be found that about 65% of the total number of imigrants that have come into Canada this last year, are of Anglo-Saxon origin. The Mail-Empire might favor its readers with a few facts occasionally.


