EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met February 10th. Minutes confirmed.
Hastie-McInnis—That a grant of \$8 as aid be given to Chas. Kerr who is ill. Carried.
McInnis-McQueen—That C. Ramage be paid \$9, balance of printing account, and \$3 for Fin. Statements. Carried.
Councillor Hastie reported everything satisfactory re Treasurer's securities. Cost of search \$1.
Sharp-McQueen—That forgoing report be adopted and \$1 cost of search be paid. Carried.
McInnis-McQueen—That the assessment roll be laid on the table to ascertain if the statements made that certain ratepayers had no vote at last municipal election are correct. Carried.
McInnis-McQueen—That after examining the roll we find that the voters' list as issued by the clerk is correct according to the assessment roll. Carried.

Councillor McInnis reported that his attention had been called to the unsafe condition of the bridge at lot 12, concession 15 and 16, and ask that provision be made to have a bridge built if considered necessary.
Hastie-McQueen—That forgoing report be received and action be deferred till spring opens. Carried.

McInnis-Sharp—That D. Allan be paid \$31.40 registration fees for recording 95 births, 23 marriages and 30 deaths at 20c each. Carried.

McInnis-Hastie—That Reeve, McQueen and the Mover be a committee to meet with the representatives from Arthur council to have matters relating to statute labor and road improvement adjusted on Wednesday, 22nd March, at 2 p. m., at the Coyne House, Mount Forest. Carried.

A great change in the weather the last week, a thaw after an extreme cold spell makes a big change.

He made a few days visit and left for home thinking that she was getting better, and as he stopped off to see a sister living near Hamilton he received a telegram to return to the States as the sick sister was dead. He has now arrived home to find his son's wife in a very low state, but we think improving.

Amongst the other sick here is the Russell family, Ainsworth Jack's family and J. McArdle all complaining with La Grippe, but I hear are getting better.

Mr. Jas. Dingwell is rejoicing over the birth of a son.

One of our young men John, Richard son Jr., is away up in Huron Co. and rumor says he will bring a wife home to us.

A SEPARATE PARTY.—Mr. Tucker, the Patron member, is not at all pleased with the manner in which he has been adopted wholesale by the Conservatives. "I am a Patron" says Mr. Tucker, "and not a Conservative. I belong to neither party, and am as much a Liberal as a Conservative."

Hamilton hotelkeepers tried to raise the price of whiskey from 5c to 10c a glass, but the attempt only lasted one week. It is expected the matter will be again taken up by the Provincial Licensed Hotelkeepers' Protective Association, with a view to make it general over the province.

LECTURE ON HOLLAND.—The lecture on Holland announced for the Methodist church, February 9th had to be postponed on account of the extreme severity of the weather. The lecture will likely take place soon, when it is hoped weather conditions will not interfere with the desire to hear this fine lecture.

The death of Mr. Geo. Keefer, Flesherton, removes a well known figure in this county. He died on Friday last, aged 76. In religion he supported Methodist doctrines, in politics was a lifelong Liberal. He leaves a widow, four sons and three daughters as chief mourners. One of the sons is Rev. Robert Keefer, of the Methodist church, Mildmay.

—The provincial elections in New Brunswick have resulted in an overwhelming victory for the government which has 40 seats, Opposition 4, Independent 2. Mr. Geo. E. Foster spent some time there as did also Hon. Mr. Blair, Minister of Railways, and their presence gave the contest a coloring of Dominion Party lines, which makes the result amount to a great Liberal victory.

Holmes, the Liberal candidate was elected in W. Huron on Tuesday by 73 majority. This in a constituency usually Conservative, is a Great Liberal Victory.
