President Loubet has just escaped assassination owing to the villain mistaking his man, an unfortunate, or fortunate resemblance, (as viewed from opposite stand points), causing the mistake. "Uneasy lies the head that wears a crown."

Following the loss of the "Stella" in the English Channel with its record of 80 lives lost, comes news of other disasters from collisions, etc., adding to the list of casualties, and forcibly showing the "perils of the deep."

The Czar's peace commission is to assemble in the Hague shortly. While every one desires peace, there is a prevailing feeling of suspicion which does not bode well for the negotiations. This suspicious feeling has been decidedly strengthened, by the Czar's tyrannous treatment of the liberty loving Finns.

The Witness thinks that Sir Hibbert Tupper's long speech and the prominent part he is taking this session indicate another generation of Tupper leadership. The Liberals, we believe, can stand this if the other fellows can. The "viTupperation" of the son will have the same effect as that of the father.

What tyranny we read of in half civilized countries? Here is the Associated Press sending a despatch informing us: that the King of Siam has forbidden children entirely naked from playing in the streets of his capital, that every person over ten years must be clothed from the knee to the neck! and that on entering the palace you must wear socks. It is rumored that the fair ones of Siam, (just as their sisters at Toronto and Ottawa parliament openings would do) are going to object.

Sir Chas. Hibbert Tupper in the closing hours of parliament before the Easter recess gave a 7-hours speech, covering of course all partition points, but especially charging Mr. Sifton and his department with incompetency in their management of the Yukon. He made serious charges of gross immorality against Major Walsh, government administrator for some time. Sir Hibbert has not raised his reputation as a fair fighter by talking out the last session so as to leave no room for a reply for a week or more by the minister he attacks. And more, he announces that business in British Columbia will prevent him hearing the reply when parliament re-assembles. We have seen little boys do this: call names and "scoot" before the big boy got at them. The charges are serious, but as yet unsupported. Wait for Sifton.

WRECKED BY RACING. Over Eighty Persons Were Drowned.

The following details are from last Friday's despatches. What awaits it to read of heroism by the crew and "perfect order prevailed" when the criminal fact that racing was indulged in is known to be the cause of the disaster. Fool-hardy captains there are as in many other cases of leadership, and the many will continue to suffer unless stringent legislation prevent criminal carelessness or bravado: Southampton, March 31.—The passenger steamer Stella, plying between this port and the Channel Islands, crashed upon the dreaded Casquet rocks, near the Island of Alderney, yesterday afternoon, in a dense fog, and foundered in ten minutes, her boilers exploding with a tremendous report as she went down. It is estimated that between 60 and 100 persons were drowned. The coasting steamer Lynx, which brought the news of the disaster here, picked up four boats and 40 persons belonging to the Stella.

The Stella, which belongs to the London and South-Western Railway Company, left Southampton at noon yesterday, conveying the first day-light excursion of the season to the Channel Islands. There were about 185 passengers on board, taking an Easter holiday, and the crew numbered 35 men.

The weather was foggy, but all went well until the afternoon, when

the fog became most dense. At four o'clock the Casquet suddenly loomed up through the fog bank, and the steamer almost immediately afterwards struck amidship. The captain, seeing that the Stella was fast sinking ordered the lifeboats to be launched. His instructions were carried out with the utmost celerity, and the women and children were embarked in the boats. Then the captain ordered the men to look after themselves.

The passengers all agree that perfect order and discipline prevailed on board the Stella. The crew promptly took up their stations when the steamer struck, served out the life belts, and lowered the boats. The scene at the moment of the sinking of the vessel was heartrending. Women were screaming and praying and people were clinging to spars and other wreckage in all directions. Those who had succeeded in getting into the boats had a narrow escape from being engulfed on account of the suction caused by the sinking vessel.
